SECOND COVERING OF POTATOES In localities where potatoes are largely grown for market, the second covering of potatoes, as it is called, is an important operation. It is mainly practised where potatoes are put in drills and ridged up in planting. Just as the young plants peep out of the ground a coverer goes through the rows scraping the dirt from the centre over the ridge and ourying the plants anew. This second covering of dirt destroys any potato bugs' eggs that may have been laid on the leaves So far from being an injury to the crop it is a decided benefit, and in destroying weeds is more effective than any other cultivation that can be given. It is this labor saying device which enables potato growers on a large scale to continue in business, though prices of potatoes are unreasonably low.
