Mr. Turner (Ottawa-Carleton), seconded by Mr. McIlraith, by leave of the House, introduced Bill C-216, An Act to establish the Tax Review Board and to make certain amendments to other Acts in relation thereto, which was read the first time and ordered to be printed and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The text of the Message and recommendation of the Governor General printed pursuant to Standing Order 62(2) in relation to the foregoing Bill is as follows:

His Excellency the Governor General recommends to the House of Commons a measure to establish the Tax Review Board and to make certain amendments to other Acts in relation thereto, to provide for the salaries, travelling allowances and annuities of the members of the Board, for the duties of and appeals to the Board, for the appointment of a Registrar and a Deputy Registrar and for their salaries and superannuation;

To provide also that the salaries, travelling allowances and annuities payable to members, former members and widows of former members shall be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and that all other expenditures shall be paid out of moneys appropriated by Parliament for the purpose;

And to provide further for certain transitional or related amendments.

The Order being read for the consideration of the Business of Supply;

Pursuant to Standing Order 58, Mr. Macquarrie, seconded by Mr. Aiken, moved,—That this House repudiates the government's postal service policies and censures those Ministers of the Crown responsible for the mismanagement of the postal services which, within two years, have deteriorated through fewer mail deliveries, fewer post offices, higher postal rates, disrupted and irregular services, and deplorable labour-management relations, to the prejudice of all Canadians, postal employees, and the national economy.

And debate arising thereon;

By unanimous consent, the House reverted to "Routine Proceedings".

Mr. Watson, from the Standing Committee on Indian Affairs and Northern Development, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Pursuant to its Order of Reference of Wednesday, April 22, 1970, your Committee has considered Bill C-202, An Act to prevent pollution of areas of the arctic waters adjacent to the mainland and islands of the Canadian arctic, and has agreed to report it with the following amendment:

Clause 6:

Delete line 37, in subclause (3), on page 6 and substitute the following therefor:

"and all such claims shall rank firstly in favour of persons who have suffered actual loss or damage as provided in paragraph (e) of subsec-
