(By a Staff Reporter.) LONDON, Ont., Oct. 22.- Hon. m Beck today won another fight gainst private monopoly. mpaigns ever waged in London, the bylaw to raise \$700,000 in debentures

to electrify the London and Port Stanley Railway was carried today by a majority of 746. The storm sewers, West London breakwater and the board of control bylaws all carried by large majorities.

The bylaw to spend \$40,000 for torm sewers carried by 1928 majorty: London west will have a \$25,000 breakwater, the majority for this being 2166; while the citizens decided in favor of a board of control by a majority of 1849.

Two men found on an upper level ere taken from the mine tonight. tescuers were called from all parts of the southern Colorado coal fields. The Stag mine is owned by the Phelps-Dodge Co. of New York. The day shift working in shaft No. 3 numbered 230 persons.

The cause of the explosion is known. Fire had not broken out, the smoke was seen issuing from the second level of the shaft. It was believed by rescuers that this smoke came from the explosion and not from fire. Immediately after the explosion all shifts were called to the work of rescue, and those miners who were emproyed in other shafts were put to work drilling thru the debris which was said to have blocked the mine below the second level.

Rescuers Work Desperately. The U.S. rescue car stationed at Trinidad was summoned and every available man in Dawson tonight was aiding in the attempt to reach the entombed miners.

Rescuers worked heroically to supply air to the men.
