

"Mackenzie money owns the Toront Suburban Railway, which holds the franchise in Ward Seven and operates a line of railway along Davenport road also from West Toronto to Lambton and from West Toronto to Weston. It would be essential in any deal with Sir William Mackenzie to include this line also.

"Under such a plan as I have out-lined, the Provincial Hydro Commis-sion, representing the Ontario Govern-ment, could retain for its own use the Electrical Development Company and the transmission lines of the Toronto-Niagara Power Company, including the right of way between Toronto and Niagara Falls and the radial railways, and hand over to the City of Toronto all the property within the city. 


