TO DASH AT ZEPPELINS

NOW HELD BY DUTCH

PREPARED TO RETREAT

British Aviators Will Face Almost Certain Death Under Pledge.

Army of King Albert Had Determined to Give Up Town.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—It was announced by Walter Runciman, president of the board of trade, at a patriotic meeting in Kingsway Hall here last night that "if Zeppelins raid London all the members of the British flying corps have pledged themselves to dash their machines right thru the airships even if both are brought to earth."

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The admiralty announces that in response to an appeal from the Belgian Government, a marine brigade and two naval brigades, equipped with heavy naval guns, were sent by the British Government to participate in the defence of Antwerp during the last week of the attack.

OSTEND, Belgium, Oct. 11.—It is now permissible to mention in connection with the siege of Antwerp features of greatest interest, hitherto for military reasons, shrouded in secrecy.

OSTEND EXPECTS AN EARLY SIEGE

British Gun Drove Away Zeppelin — City is Crowded With Refugees.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 12, 2.15 a.m.—A despatch to The Daily Telegraph from Ostend says: "The past two days have been a hard experience for Ostend, which is crowded with refugees, who are being despatched as rapidly as possible to England."

ME AND GOD AGAIN

LONDON, Oct. 11.—It is asserted that the kaiser has sent the following proclamation to his army in East Prussia: "The Holy Spirit has descended upon me. As the German emperor, I am the instrument of the Most High. I am the sword and the rod. Woe and death be unto those who resist my will and who do not believe in my mission. Woe and death unto all cowards and enemies. The German God demands their destruction. God, thru me, commands you to fulfil His will."

Zeppelin Raid on French Capital Resulted in Only Slight Damage, as Bombs Dropped on Notre Dame Failed To Explode—Allies Defeated Germans in Battle East of Termonde, and Won Cavalry Fight at Aire—Kaiser Wants To Sweep Belgium and Advance on Ostend Has Commenced—Siege of Antwerp Cost the Germans Heavily and Its Fall May Mean the Prolongation of the War, According to Officials.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Paris was again under fire from German aeroplanes today. Twenty bombs were dropped in various parts of the city, killing three persons and wounding four others. One bomb was aimed directly at Notre Dame and fell on the roof of the church, but failed to explode.

The most important development of the day was a battle east of Termonde, in which French and British troops defeated a force of 20,000 Germans, part of the army which besieged Antwerp, advancing on Ostend.

BOMBS DROPPED OVER TSINGTAU Japanese Aviators' Attack of German Airmen by Damaging City Now Besieged.

TOKYO, Oct. 11.—The following official statement was given out today, referring to operations in China: "The German forts, war ships and aeroplanes, are trying vainly to arrest Japanese advance. We have sustained no damage. A Japanese warship silenced Hsiao fort and drove a warship out of range of our guns."
