## DR. W. C. GILDAY DEAD Altho Only 28 Years Old He Stood High in Profession.

In the death of Dr. William C. Gilday yesterday, at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gilday, 7 Moss Park-place, there was closed a sareer of great promise. Altho only in his 28th year, the late Dr. Gilday was a member of the Royal College of Surgeons and licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of London, Ens.

Born in Leeds County in 1882, his parents removed to Toronto when he was a child. He was educated at Dufferin public school and Jarvis Collegiderin public school and Jarvis Collegi-ate, and in 1905 took the degree of bachelor of medicine at Toronto University. For two years he was a house surgeon at St. Michael's Hospital, lator proceeding to London, England, where he continued his studies. The next two years he spent in Birmingham, where he equipped himself as a specialist in diseases of the eye, ear and throat. He returned to Toronto last June and opened a consulting of-fice at 90 -College-street, and resumed

his connection with St. Michael's Hos-Dr. Gilday's death came after an filness of more than seven weeks. The malady, a curious one, began as inflammation of the lining of the heart, which developed into blood poisoning. He had a wide circle of friends in Toronto, and his death will be deeply regretted. The funeral will be held at 2.30 p.m. to-morrow.

# PROF. PEPPER SAYS

Had Not Established Sex of Victim -Juror Fainted at the Crippen Trial.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—The prosecution continued its case against Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, charged with the murder of his wife, the actress Belie Elmore, to-day, by introducing the testimony of Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard, who pursued the doctor and his companion, Ethel Clars Leneve, across the Atlantic and brought them back to England under arrest.

The inspector's evidence was a repetition of the now familiar story, which he had recited previously in the lower courts. While Alfred Aspinall Tobin. chief counsel for Crippen, was cross-examining Dew, with the object of showing that the defendant exhibited

examining Dew, with the object of showing that the defendant exhibited no trace of anxiety or nervousness during the police investigations at his Hilldrop-Crescent home, one of the jurors fainted and the court was adjourned for two hours.

When the session was resumed, Prof. Augustus Pepper, the pathologist who examined the dismembered parts, was called, and his testimony, which was a recapitulation of the gruesome recital at the earlier hearings, occupied the afternoon up to adjournment.

Prof. Pepper has been unable to determine anatomically the sex of the Hildrop-Crescent house victim, but was satisfied that the parts were human, and that they had been severed by a hand skilled somewhat in surgery. The organs were healthy and indicated a stoutish person in middle life. They had been buried not less than four months and for not more than eight months. One part bore a scar left from an operation.

Every precaution is being taken to guard Crippen against self destruction, it was learned this afternoon. The prison doctor supervises the cooking of his meals and no food is allowed the prisoner but fresh-laid eggs and soup; All the food is especially served at the infirmary.

Talked Over-Campaign to Wipe Out \$15,000 Deficit.

Most of the discussion at yesterday afternoon's session of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec resulted from the presentation of the annual report of the home mission board. The record has been one of success, and Rev. W. E. Norton, superintendent, was most optimistic in his outlook for the jubilee year upon which the Baptists are entering.

Dr. Norton urged that the deficit of \$15,000 should be wiped out. It was also proposed to raise a jubilee fund of \$40,000, out of which \$5000 might be used for wiping off the deficit. The balance could be invested in a building reserve fund, the interest going to the assistance of weak and struggling home mission churches.

The report contained the suggestions of a special committee, appointed to determine methods that would stimulate the increased contributions of home mission churches to their own support. All such churches will in the future be requested to adopt the weekly envelope system in their offerings towards pastoral support. New churches in the rural districts of New Ontario are expected to contribute at the rate of \$5 per year per member; churches in the rural districts of old Ontario, \$8 per member; new churches in new towns, \$12 per member, and churches in towns of old Ontario, \$8 per member; new churches in new towns of old Ontario, \$8 per member, and churches in two sold of the scarcity of Ministers.
