The defection of the Afridis is regarded as being especially serious, as they have been loyal during many Indian outbreaks, and guarded the Khyber Pass for the British during the Afghan War. They are one of the most powerful tribes on the frontier.

About one hundred insurgent tribesmen were killed in the attack made by General Blood, the British commander, yesterday upon the entrenched positions in the hills of the Swat Valley. General Blood brought his field guns into action against the stone entrenchments of the enemy, demolished these works and the insurgent tribesmen fied. About 3000 of the latter were engaged.

Afrida Threatening Jamrud.

Simila, Aug. 18.—It is believed 10,000 Afridis are threatening Jamrud, but the place is considered proof against attack by any force without artillery. Before venturing to attack Jamrud the Afridis. it is expected, wil try their strength on the smaller forts in Khyber Pass.

Additional reinforcements of infantry, cayalry an dartillery have been ordered cavalry an dartillery have been ordered to proceed from Simla to Poshawar to-day, while troops are being moved forward to replace those sent to the front. The work of mobilization is proceeding
