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THE CZAR'S PEACE PROPOSALS

Nicholas Wants a General Reduction of Armaments and an Understanding Among the Nations-Can the Tricky Russian Diplomats Be Trusted?-Text of the Note.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—By order of Emperor Nicholas, Count Muravieff, the Foreign Minister, on the 24th instant, handed to the foreign diplomats at St. Petersburg a note declaring that the maintenance of peace and the reduction of the excessive strive. The Czar considers the present moment favorable for the inauguration of a movement looking to this end, and has invited the powers to take part in an international conference, as a means of thus assuring real and lasting peace and terminating the progressive increase of armaments.

—Text of the Note.

London, Ang. 28.—The Czar's proposition for an international conference for the purpose of securing real and lasting peace among the powers and the termination of the progressive increase in armaments, as conveyed in a note from Count Muravier, the Russian Foreign Minister, to the foreign diplomatists at St. Petersburg, is likely to produce a sensation throughout Europe, and, coming from such a quarter, and with such evident sincerity, it is likely to have important effects. There is doubt that with Russia taking the lead in such a step, Germany, France and the other nations will be ready to follow.

A Short Campaign Forecasted.

New York, Aug. 28.—The London correspondent of The Tribune says: "English opinion is keeping abreast with the British army now advancing toward Omdurman, and forecasting a short, decisive campaign. The easy conquest of Khartoum is well nigh certain, since fanaticism has lost its force in the deserts and the Soudanese are more eager to shake off the tyranny of the Khalifa than they were fourteen years ago to revolt against Egyptian misgovernment. The entire Mahdist movement will end with the fall of Khartoum, but this belated vindication of Gen. Gordon's memory will be the signal for the opening of a new series of troublesome questions. One of these will be the limitation of French activity in the Bahr El Ghazal district. Another will be the necessity for forcing some restraint upon Menelek's dream of an Abysinnian Empire."
