A Berlin correspondent cables: The news received here from Paris that the French council of war has ordered a large increase in the cadres of the army, by which 145 new battalions of infantry will be created, has thoroughly aroused public opinion here, especially in view of the announcement that the French artillery is already partly rearmed with quickfiring guns. France, under the new system, will have 105 more battalions on a peace footing than Germany, and of the financial relations commission. the German military authorities now intend to hasten the equipment of the army with new Krupp, quick-firing guns, at an expense of 260,000,000 marks. The German navy is being rapidly provided with the same type of gun, not only in the case of new vessels, but on board the older vessels.
