AMBASSADOR DURAND TO QUIT PUBLIC LIFE

Britain's Representative at Washington to Retire on March I.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 8.-According to a dispatch from Washington, Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, ambassador of Great Britain to the United States, will retire from his mission in Washington next spring. His successor, not yet chosen, will come to Washington to take charge of the embassy about March 1. The ambassador yesterday told Secretary Root of his coming retirement. As far as can be learned Sir Mortimer is not leaving his post here for any other position, and after his return to England he will probably retire from public life entirely. He entered the British diplomatic service in 1876, when he was sent to Persia. During the entire period between then and now the ambassador has been on foreign service for his Government with


