

SEVEN RECORDS BROKEN. San Francisco, Oct. 25.—Seven Pacific bicycle records were broken on the Elmhurst track Sunday, all being for unpaced riding. Geo. Q. New Competitor for the C. P. R. in Grain Carrying Trade.

Trainmaster Brown, of the Michigan Central Railway, reports that freight business has picked up greatly during the past couple of weeks. There has been a gradual increase, and while there is not the rush of freight sometimes encountered, a good steady business is being done.

Supt. Morford has received a statement showing that of the 29 independent railroads or extensions in the Province of Ontario, all have been amalgamated or leased by the big lines. The total mileage of these lines is 1,732, and the bonuses received \$1,903,563 from the Dominion, and \$3,103,333 from the Provincial Government, and \$5,500,050 from municipalities.

A Port Arthur dispatch says: There is to be built a line in the extreme southeastern part of the province, which will be known as the Ontario Rainy Lake and Western Railroad. This line will diverge from the Port Arthur and Duluth road about 20 miles west of Port Arthur, and will run up the valley of the Rainy River to a connection at the Manitoba line with the road now building from Winnipeg southeast, under Provincial Government authority. When the whole line from Winnipeg to Port Arthur is completed, which will be next year, there will be a new route on Canadian soil to compete with the Canadian Pacific for the carriage of the wheat of Manitoba to the lake. This is a purpose which the Greenway Government- has been steadfastly pursuing for a long time. The new road will open to settlement the fertile Rainy River Valley on both sides of the international boundary. The quickest way of getting to the most northern part of Minnesota will then be to go around through the Dominion.
