PORK PACKERS SAY THE BOARD'S ORDER IS IMPRACTICABLE

Declare Present Prices Represent
Actual Loss.

SUPERFICIAL INQUIRY

Statement Declares Packers
Were Not Allowed to
Give Their Side.

TORONTO, Sept. 29.—The packers
tonight issued the following statement
regarding the order of the board of
commerce:

"The order of the board of commerce
promulgated today is, on the face of it,
impracticable.

"(a) That packers are at present selling
products at prices which would
permit of reduction of two cents to
fifteen cents a pound without loss; or

"(b) That the board, without regard
to the actual cost of the product, arbitrarily imposed the reduction.

"Meats now being sold are the product
of hogs bought in the last two
months, during which live hog prices
advanced throughout the world to the
highest level in history. At present
prices these meats are showing heavy
losses. In regard to this loss packers
desire no sympathy. It is a phase of
the business which they meet in every
year's operations.

"Small Profits.

"The actual facts are that in its most
prosperous year the profits of the packing
industry in Canada were less than
one-half cent per pound of product
sold.

"The order assumes to fix selling
prices of products on the basis of
market prices in March, regardless of
and ignorant as to whether these
prices will return cost or not.

"The action of the board has been
taken after a superficial inquiry without
conference with the trade and
without any opportunity being afforded
of presenting the packers' case.

"Not only does the order assume to
fix present prices on an unfair basis,
but it enacts a basis of continued fixing
of prices, which is unscientific
and unsound, and would necessitate
the operation of all plants at a continual
loss.

"If left to take a normal course
prices of products will decline in keeping
with the lower tendency of live hogs,
but without the demoralization of
the trade and of the live hog industry,
to the detriment of the entire
country, which must inevitably result
from the enforcement of such ill-
advised regulation.

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Toronto Man Finds Pearl As Large As Cherry in Oyster

TORONTO, Sept. 29.—E. E.
Mann, who will give no more
definite address than Dovercourt
district, was probably the most
surprised man in Toronto when
he found a pearl as large as a
small cherry on the inside of an
oyster shell in a King street cafe. An
offer of \$500 has already been
made to have been made to Mr. Mann
by a Toronto jeweler, but it will
be sent to New York to be
"skinned" before any offer will
be considered. Jewellers who have
seen the pearl say that if it has
no flaws it will be worth \$5,000.

Incensed Mob Lynches Two More Negroes

Men Charged With Offences
Against White Woman
Shot to Death.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 29.—Two
negroes, Miles Phifer and Robert Crow-
key, the latter a discharged soldier, were
taken from county officials about five
miles from Montgomery late today and
shot to death by a mob of twenty-five
masked men. Both negroes were charged
with assaulting white women.

The two negroes were being taken to
the prison at Wetumpka for safe-
keeping, when the mob held up the
automobile carrying them. The mob
forced the county officers to surrender
their arms, led the negroes to a wood
and opened fire on them with shotguns
and pistols.

Attempts Made to
Wreck Trains On
South Coast Line

Trains Now Running On Near-
ly Every Railway—
River Boats Used.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—(Reuter Agency.)
Two attempts to wreck the London
to Brighton trains by bombers on the
line have been reported. The bombers
are now on guard on the line.

Strikers in Scotland have held up two
trains, and one fireman was injured.

The London and Brighton Company
deny that 75 per cent of the drivers and
firemen have resumed work.

Except on certain of the trunk lines to
the north, trains are now running on
nearly every railway.

An official report states that the
Great Western service is almost normal.

Many of the railway residents, however,
are still in the city by river boats.

The London electricians' union has
decided to take no action at present.

At a meeting the livemen pledged their
support of the Government and
demanded the immediate reassembly
of parliament.

An extraordinary large number of
volunteers are coming forward.

The position of the underground rail-
ways is much more hopeful. The power
stations are fully manned by
volunteers.

The renewal of the power
will also enable the restarting of the
position of South London. Troops
are being transported to important
centres by drivers, which are also
conveying some mails.

The sympathetic strike of the fish
porters at Bristol has resumed work.

Despite the promising signs, Secre-
tary Bromley of the drivers and fire-
men's union asserts the struggle will
be long and most severe.

WOMAN CONFESSES
TO INCENDIARISM,
GIVEN THREE YEARS

ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 29.—Miss
Hannah Matilda Rink was sentenced
to three years in Kingston penitentiary
for the charge of arson today. The
judge, Livingstone at Welland this afternoon
after she had pleaded guilty to
the charge of arson in the burning of
the house of Mrs. Rink. It was ac-
cused it was argued that she was ec-
centric.

Two men who were connected with
Miss Rink in the incendiarism were re-
cently sentenced to two and three years
respectively. William and Arthur
Phlips, is out on \$10,000 bail, awaiting trial
on a charge of counselling Miss Rink to
leave the crime committed. The building
in question had been recently purchased
by her.

COAL OPERATORS IN
CONFERENCE WITH
MINERS' DELEGATES

BUFFALO, Sept. 29.—The reply of
the operators of the central competitive
field to the demands of E. H. the
for increased wages and a shorter work-
ing day was submitted at today's con-
ference of operators and miners. Al-
though the text of the communication
was not made public, it is said to have
contained no counter proposals. Dwell-
ing chiefly on the operators' contention
that the war-time agreement was still
in force and effect and that the miners'
delegates lacked definite authority from
the United Mine Workers to conclude
a new agreement.

To this, acting President John L.
Lewis replied in conference without
asking for an adjournment to consider
the operators' reply. The resolutions
advanced by the operators, he said,
were not sufficient to sweep the miners'
demands from the table.

The discussion was heated, but the
communication from the operators did
not close the door to further negotia-
tions, and when both sides adjourned
to hold a caucus it was the under-
standing that a further communication
would be submitted by the operators
at tomorrow's meeting.

Cunard Liner Sails
With 2,000 Aboard
Despite the Strike

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The Cunard Line
steamer Saxonia sailed from Tilbury for
New York today, notwithstanding the
inconveniences created by the railroad
strike. The vessel has on board 2,000
passengers, most of whom motored to
London bridge, from where they were
taken by river steamers down stream
to Tilbury, where they boarded the
Saxonia.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The militia de-
partment has been advised that the
liner Empress of France, carrying 30
Canadian officers, 1 other rank, and 13
dependents will reach Quebec on or
about October 4.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN MAY NOT APPEAR IN HOUSE AGAIN

Friends of the Premier Admit
That His Condition Is
Serious.

RETIREMENT IS URGED

Doctors Advise Head of Union
Government To Cease
Work.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The condition of
Sir Robert Borden's health is tonight
occasioning keen anxiety to his col-
leagues and physicians. His followers
in the Commons are no longer blinking
at facts; the premier is very seriously ill,
and tonight the possibility of his not
again appearing in Parliament is freely
admitted. Sir Robert was to have ap-
peared before a general caucus of his
followers tomorrow morning to submit
his plans for the establishment of the
Unionist party, with platform and
organization; his physicians have ad-
vised that there will not be response
for the results if he goes, and the
caucus has been postponed indefinitely.
