Will Discuss Plans For New Collegiate and Other

Definite decision to commence building of new schools at once may be made Record Their Sorrow at Death at a special meeting of the board of education this afternoon. While no bulk tenders have been received for plans for a new collegiate have to be considered, as well as the establishment of a new school in the northeast

ment of a new school in the northeast section of the city.

No. 3 committee will bring a recommendation before the board that the construction of a collegiate with 36 classrooms be started immediately on the site of the building destroyed by fire. This may prove a debatable point.

Before the fire which made the erection of a new collegiate, the board was planning the erection of a branch school in South London. Only lower school elasses would have been accommodated at this, while the central collegiate, in time, would be used only for middle and upper classes. It was argued that as there were comparatively few pupils in the upper grades it would be easier for them to come to one school in the centre of the city than it would for the large number of lower school pupils. Some members of the board, however, favored the building of one large central collegiate for all classes, although this was not indexed by the department of education.

The board this afternoon may want to carry out the former plan and agrange for at least two high schools. The building of a new public school somewhere on Quebec street near Oxford will likely be indorsed, as well as plans for improvements at south Colborne Street School.

Prospects of a Supply Before Christmas Growing Brighter.
