HAMILTON LAWYERS SAY THAT PRICES MUST GO UP

Annual Church Meetings Held—Sudden Death of Machinist—Gun Club Tournament.

HAMILTON, Jan. 15.—(Special).—Ernest Geiss, 428 Ferguson-avenue, a machinist employed by the Canada Screw Company, died suddenly this evening. He was taken ill at his work about 4.30, and was removed to his home, breathing his last about 7. Paralysis of the great vessels was the cause of death. He was 64 years of age.

BANK OF COMMERCE MOVE THE TALK OF MONTREAL

Directors of Bank of Montreal Do Not Believe Their Bank Will Lose Leading Place.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—(Special).—As a matter of course the news from Toronto to the effect that the Canadian Bank of Commerce had authorized the increase of its capital to \$15,000,000, or as the street puts it, to a sum considerably in excess of that of the Bank of Montreal, causes a good deal of talk in money circles.

The directors of the big bank do not believe, however, that their institution will take second place to the Commerce just yet, as they say that although authorization has been secured the capital will not be advanced at a time, and that it may be some years before the Bank of Montreal is left behind in the race.

The statement, however, is made that the Bank of Montreal will continue its conservative policy, which means that whenever the management considers its capital insufficient to meet requirements of the country, it will be increased. Some two Lower Province banks were taken in and no doubt the same policy will be adopted when any future absorption takes place.

would be taught what a privilege it was to be able, by the payment of a few cents, to associate himself with the 300th birthday of Canada, and with the battlefields of Quebec, which gave to French-Canadians good government and a place within the empire, to British half a continent on this side of the Atlantic, and an empire of self-governing dominions and to the United States their independence.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier gave his most hearty support to the idea which he said would radiate from the old cities of Quebec, east and west, until it reached the two oceans. Nowhere on earth was ground so consecrated as the battlefields of Quebec.

After describing the historic conflict between Wolfe and Montcalm, Sir Wilfrid showed that from that moment a continent of British authority on this continent, because the seeds of discord which had long existed in the British colonies at last were let loose.

The government had proclaimed their reverence from the motherland.

"It is not a fact," asked Sir Wilfrid, "that the British authority at that time was saved on this continent by the very men who were defeated on the Plains of Abraham? These battlefields had been too long neglected."

The monument to Wolfe was absolutely unworthy of the hero it was intended to recall and of the people of Canada.

R. L. Borden was also proud to say a word in behalf of the movement to have a monument erected on the site of the battle of the Plains of Abraham.

The bill, which would take the money out of the treasury and give it to the Ontario Government, would have been other than this.

Mr. Hendrie said to-day that the Ontario Government would fight the attempt of the radial and other railways to get iron from provincial legislation affecting securing provincial charters.
