FOUR FAVORITES IN FRONT BUSY AGAIN THE BEST

Hanbridge Makes New Track Record at Blue Bonnets—Attendance Increases.

MONTREAL, June 8.—(From Our Own Reporter.)—The third day of the Montreal meeting saw another increase in the attendance, particularly on the members' lawn. The feature event was the Kindergarten Stakes, for 2-year-olds, which brought out the best lot of youngsters at the track, including Flying Scourge, Busy and Setback, three of the best 2-year-olds that raced at Toronto. The filly Turf Star was withdrawn, owing to her having contracted fever on the way to Blue Bonnets. Another event that created a great deal of interest was the steeplechase. The scratches in this reduced the original entry of eight to four, two of which were from the Colt stable. The weather was ideal for the sport, while the track was faster than on Monday, when the events were all run off in fast time. In the betting ring a number of new layers of odds drew in, there being a heavy play on Flying Scourge and Busy, which were well supported, while only the wiser ones were down on the winner. There was one track record broken, while another was equalled. The new record was made by Hanbridge, who beat Jack Parker in the first race under one of the hardest drives that have ever been made over the B. track. This is the second track record this spring that this horse has broken. At Toronto he established a new mark, while again at Hamilton, Bermuda, he repeated the feat.
