### FIERCE ACTION ON **RUMANIAN FRONT**

(Continued From Page 1).

tro-German forces, continuing their tro-German forces, continuing their heavy attacks, captured several height positions and two towns in the Zabala valley, the war office announces. Violent Russian and Rumanian counter-attacks were repulsed. In Wallachia the Russians were again defeated, being driven back to positions half way between Rimnik-Sarat and Fokshany. The Danube army has driven the Russians to the Braila bridgehead.

The British admiralty, per wireless press, gave out the following official account of the operations in Itumania, announced officially in Petrograd to-

announced officially in Petrograd today:

"The enemy strongly attacked the Rumanians on the front north and south of the River Kasino, eight versts east of the Moldavian frontier. The Rumanians maintained their positions. An attack by the enemy pressed back the Rumanians near the seurce of the River Rimna and obliged them to retire to the region of Patroanu, 20 versts west of Fakshany.

Take Up New Positions.

"In the region of Fokshany and further to the southeast, as far as the Danube, our detachments took up new positions during the night without pressure from the enemy's flank.

In the region of the River Domuk the enemy took the offensive north of the brook which flows into the River Brunk-Hatak. From one of the heights the enemy succeeded in

The following is the German official bulletin, issued at Berlin today:



Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but no: Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months, residence may

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A honesteader may live within nine inlies of his nomestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in one vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a nomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead Price, \$2.00 per acres.

acre.

Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent, also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtaized as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settier who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. acre.

Duties.— Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres, and erect a house worth 3300.
