## DENTALS ARE BEATEN LACKED COMBINATION

## CANNOT INSULT BALL MAGNATES

## CHAMPION JACK MAY MAKES THE SACRIFICE

Well-Known Toronto Amateur Boxer Succumbed to Shell Shock in December.

Jack May, one of the best known of the local amateur boxers, was killed in France on December 18th, the result of shell shock, according to a letter just received by his mother. May went to England with the 51st Battalion and was transferred to the 43rd Central Postal Directory, which unit he went over to France and to the firing line.

Deceased was an Englishman, who had lived in Toronto seven years. Prior to enlisting he was with the Toronto Electric Light Co.

May won international Ontario and Canadian championships in three classes, viz., welterweight, middleweight, and heavyweight, and was one of the best amateur boxers ever seen in the ring in Toronto. He was a member of the St. Charles Club.
