REMARKABLE YIELD OF OATS PROMISED

Eighty Bushels to the Acre Highest Yet Reported.

OTHER CROPS GOOD

Ontario Outlook Continues to Favor Excellent Harvest in All Lines.

Mest of the fall wheat has been cut and housed, but some is yet in the shock. In yield per acre it will be about an average crop, altho the returns per acre vary greatly, even in the same localities. The total acreage, of course as previously axplained, is smaller than usual.

Spring wheat will be above its average in yield and in the length of straw, with probably an increased acreage as well.

Rye has a similar record to that of fall wheat.

tage, taking quantity and quality of both grain and straw into consideration. A fair portion of the crop already has been harvested.
Out fields, as a rule, have been a revelation of growth. Some of the yields reported run as high as 70 and 80 bushels to the acre, while 50 and 80 are common. The straw is of unusual length, but only a little rust is so far reported. The heads as a rule are well filled, but occasional complaints of smut are made. The only fear expressed regarding oats is the possibility of rains "lodging" the crop before cutting, owing to the rather rank growth of straw. Cutting has begun in some quarters.

Hay Mostly Saved.

Hay has turned out to be an excellent crop, being well above the average in yield, and most of the cut being of good quality. Colls may yet be seen in some fields, the grain crops having overtaken.

Apples, which did not set heavily, dropped considerably during the summer, and will be a poor yield generally. Fears and plums have done somewhat better. Peaches will be fair, relatively. Raspberry growers did well this year where pickers were available.



Live Stock—All classes of live stock are reported to be in good health. Very few sales, generally speaking, are being made. Good draught horses are bringing from \$175 to \$200: general purpose from \$125 to \$180. In Grey County, nine carloads of cattle, chiefly butchers' animals, left a local station one day last week. At a sale in Halton County, grade Holstein cows sold as high as \$153. Milk production is decreasing, owing to the grass failing, but the ficw is yet well up to the average for the time of year.

Hogs keep up in price, selling at 15½c to 17½c a lb., according to point of purchase.

Labor.—With harvesting about half thru, a keen demand for farm laborers is still on. During the past week there has still on. During the past week there has been an improved response from the towns and cities to calls from the farm. Fortunately, good harvest weather has help in the clearing off of the ripening crops. Farmers are exchanging work more largely than ever, and their wives and daughters are helping with the rush in the fields. More milking machines are being installed in the dairy districts, and larger field irrplements are being purchased. Regarding the use of improved machinery, one representative stated that machinery, one representative stated that he is "snowed under" by requests for the use of the tractor to get the land ready for the new fall wheat.
