The second Resolution was moved by the Rev. J. Stannage, seconded by R. G. Haliburton, Esq., A. M.

Resolved, That the Society, desires to express gratitude for the success which has attended the arms of our country, and the hope that it will open a new way for the spread of Christianity, the first step to which has already been taken by the appointment of a large staff of Chaplains and Missionaries in the East by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

A collection was then made in aid of the funds of the Society.

The Rev. W. Bullock moved the second Resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Marriott.

Resolved, That as the struggle in which our country is now engaged may tend to diminish the income of the parent Societies in England, and the aid they can afford to this Diocese, it becomes us, who are in a great measure free from the heavy burdens of that contest, to increase our exertions for the support of our Church.

The meeting then sang the Doxology, and was dismissed with the Apostolical benediction.

OF THE

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,

For 1854.
