SUES FOR \$5,000 FOR COLD CAUGHT SERVING ON JURY

First Case of its Kind in States and Sutor is Bowled Out of Court

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 31.—First of its kind in the history of legal jurisprudence in the United States was the action instituted by E. G. Merchant of Spokane, \$5,000 damages for a cold contracted while serving as a juror in the superior court in December, 1907.

Judge Webster decided that the plaintiff was not entitled to recover damages for the cold, but the court was made.

Merchant filed a claim for \$1,000 damages with the county commissioners in March, 1908, following his services in the jury case.

Suit was instituted in the Spokane county superior court the following fall, but H. L. Kennan sustained a demurrer on the ground that the case was not filed within ninety days after the original claim was submitted to the county committee.

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MEAT PRICES DEVELOP STRANGE SITUATION

New York, Feb. 1.—Retail meat dealers in this city today faced a perplexing situation. With the demand from consumers fallen off to a greater extent than ever before in the history of the trade, the dealers found themselves confronted by an advancing scale of prices.

Wholesale rates went up only a fraction of a cent yesterday, but the dealers were advised that certain shipments were likely to lead to a further advance today.

There was no appreciable change in retail meat quotations today, but the dealers had no matter if shipments are heavily reduced.

The eight cent rate for milk rules now, and one of these has announced a reduction effective on March 1.

FURNISH-WITHY CO. TO CONTROL THE NEPTUNE LINE

The directors of the Neptune Steam Navigation Company have issued a circular stating that they have entered into an arrangement with Sir Christopher Furness for the purchase, by him, of all the issued shares of the Neptune Company at the rate of 15s. 6d. a share for each preference share, 15s. 6d. for each ordinary share, the same to be paid in fully paid ordinary shares of 1s. each in Furness, Withy & Co. at par.

The Neptune Company was registered in December, 1884, and re-registered seven years later, after the undertaking of the Columbia Steam Navigation Company had been acquired. Later in 1905 the capital was reduced by about £118,000. The subscribed capital is now put down at £217,900 in preference shares of 1, £210,900 in ordinary shares of 1s. each (a few are not fully paid), and 16,884 B ordinary shares, on which 1s. 8d. has been paid.

According to Lloyd's Register the Company has seven stevedores. For 1908 only six months' dividend was paid on the preference shares.
