LATE LOCALS

A large crib of pulp wood was taken up through the falls today from Mispec.

The Carleton Athletic Club will hold a concert in the city hall, West End, on Thursday next.

Dredge W. S. Fielding is out to eastward of Partridge Island today. She had been laid up making repairs.

A slight fire on the tug G. D. Hunter, yesterday morning was extinguished by streams from the tugs Neptune and Waring.

There will be a meeting of the Societe des Celebs in uniform to-morrow evening at 8 o'clock in the school room of St. Stephen's church.

Rev. P. J. Stackhouse of Campbellton occupied his former pulpit at the Tabernacle church yesterday. He spoke on the subject: "The Life that is Worth While."

Several large three-masted schooners have been laid up on the west side waiting till better freight offers. Very little lumber is being shipped by the mill owners.

An irresponsible individual who earns a livelihood by cleaning yards and doing chores about residences was arrested for boisterous conduct by Chief Clark at noon today in front of City Hall.

John Kelly, of Fort Howe, has been reported for furiously driving his team on Adelaide street last evening. It is probable also that the S.P.C.A. will take action against Kelly for cruelly treating his horses.

George Campbell of the West Side narrowly escaped being gored to death by an infuriated steer on board the steamship Athena at Montreal. Several sailors succeeded in getting the animal away from Campbell who was lying prostrate on the deck of the steamer.

There were no arrests made on Saturday and Sunday, therefore the docket in the police court this morning was slim. William Lannerman, reported for possessing a dog that bit a little girl, said the latter provoked and tormented the canine. He was told to dispose of the dog.

William A. Quinlan, late steward of the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases, announced this morning that he would be a candidate for election for the federal house in the next elections, running as an independent in St. John city and county.

The Ocean Limited was wrecked on Saturday near Riviere du Loup. The Third Regiment R. C. A., thirty-seven men strong were passengers on the train en route to this city from Petewawa. No body was injured but the vessel was cut up in six hours at Riviere du Loup. All but one car were derailed.

The steam yacht Isis, owned by Robert and J. W. Spaulding, of Boston, was in Digby on Saturday with her owners and a party of friends on board. The Isis belongs to the Boston Yacht Club. She carries a crew of 29 men and is 230 tons net.

Her owners and guests enjoyed their trip up the Annapolis River in their private steam launch accompanied by its tender.

Hereafter the persons who desecrate the tomb stones in the squares and burying ground will be vigorously prosecuted. The initial report for offences of this variety was made on Sunday, Frank Cronin, a lad, will appear in the police court tomorrow to answer the charge of defacing a bench in the burying ground by cutting his initials into the woodwork of the bench. Policeman Lucas makes the report.

Officer Wilson quelled a fracas in Thomas Keating's house, 109 Hilyard street on Sunday morning between one and two o'clock. On one side was named Keating and on the other side was his wife and several members of his family. The man had entered the apartments in the morning and endeavored to assault his wife. Two of his sons intervened with disastrous results to the disturber.

Just before seven o'clock on Saturday evening, William Morris and George Dyer entered the saloon at Reed's Point owned by Mrs. Powers, and refused to depart at the closing hour. The men endeavored to eject them, but both resisted violently and in the melee that followed, one of the belligerents was kicked on the eye. Policeman Belya was summoned and after some difficulty ejected both men.

Charles Diggs was liberated from jail on Saturday afternoon after making a solemn promise to abstain from intoxicants in the future. But the strenuous avowal was for naught, as he was seen in the evening endeavoring to negotiate a safe journey home in the combats of the Old Burying Ground. He was reposing in slumber under one of the stones when he was suddenly awakened by several boys and compelled by missiles and taunts to seek other quarters. Alexander Diggs, his brother, is serving a two months' term for assaulting a woman.

Passengers on the Kent Northern on Saturday had a rough experience reaching their destination. Four miles from the junction the engine became disabled by tube breaking and putting out the fire under the boiler. Teams were hired to drive to Kent Junction, but the I. C. R. local express for Moncton had departed when they arrived. R. O'Leary, of Richibucto, who wished to connect with the Boston train, hired a special, but reached Moncton too late to make connections. The special was delayed by hot journals. Mr. O'Leary, in order to reach Boston by Monday, left for his destination on the Maritime via Montreal.

LE BLANC TARRIED A LITTLE TOO LONG

And Now he Will Have to Answer a Very Serious Charge.

The horse and carriage hired from John Scott of Penobscot by Blair Le Blanc and intended to be used in the funeral procession on Saturday as previously stated but on July 29th Le Blanc has been in this city since that time and visited the police court the morning after he arrived from Penobscot, under the influence of liquor. He showed several policemen his business cards, which stated that he was a piano tuner and he informed the officers that he intended to enter the employ of the New Williams Sewing Machine Co. in a few days. He was desirous of ascertaining if it was necessary for him to procure a license and was referred to the mayor.

Mr. Scott, who hired the rig to Le Blanc, has been endeavoring to trace his property but did not notify the local police of the disappearance until Saturday at noon. He had believed it highly improbable that Le Blanc would come in this direction and as far as St. John. A resident of Penobscot was in town on Friday and saw Le Blanc in the depot. When he returned to Penobscot he informed Scott of his discovery and the latter wired the police department here to locate his property and the thief. Both the horse and the one he received in exchange from S. T. Golding were found in Golding's stable on Saturday afternoon, and Le Blanc was arrested.

BRIDE SAW HER HUSBAND DROWN

Terrible Fatality at Scitvate, R. I., Yesterday--The Leaky Skiff Capsized.

Scitvate, R. I., Aug. 24--In sight of his bride of four weeks, who was powerless to aid him, John Colon was drowned in Spencer's mill pond here yesterday. Mrs. Colon was within twenty feet of her husband when he sank, and the only boat in the pond was floating bottom up thirty feet off shore. Colon, who was 28 years old, with a companion named William Read, went fishing in a leaky skiff which was capsized when Colon moved forward to get the bailing dipper. Read was able to swim ashore, but Colon, who could not swim, sank. In the meantime, Mrs. Colon had waded waist deep in the water, but was powerless to aid her husband. After he sank from sight she fainted. Colon was superintendent of Irving Spencer's farm and had lived here about two years; he formerly lived near Moncton.

BURNED 2,000 BUILDINGS

Constantinople, Aug. 24--The fire which broke out in the Stamboul quarter of Constantinople yesterday was extinguished at midnight. The houses in the quarter were mostly built of wood, and proved an easy prey for the flames, carried by the high wind. It is estimated that more than 2,000 buildings were destroyed. A number of firemen and women and children are reported to have been burned to death.
