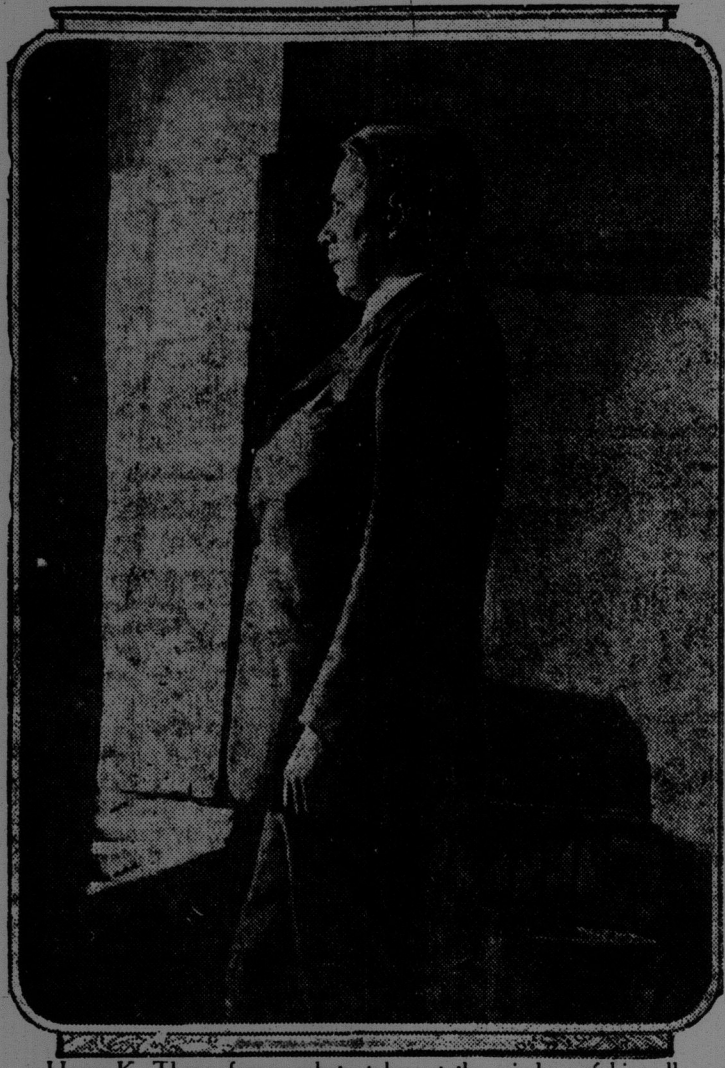

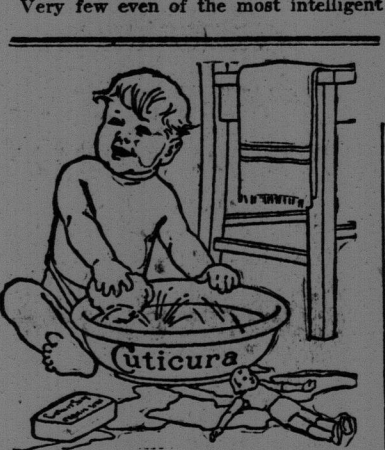
Harry K. Thaw, from a photo taken at the window of his cell.

SIR JOHN FRENCH'S FRIEND MOORE IS AN ONTARIO MAN

Remarkable Career of the Young Canadian Who Says Dominion Lads Are Greatest Fighters in the World

The Times on Monday printed a dispatch from Detroit, quoting George Gordon Moore, an intimate friend of Sir John French, who told of Canadian soldiers being crucified, and who declared that the Canadians are the world's greatest fighters. Mr. Moore is himself a Canadian, who has had a remarkable career in the United States. He was born in Lambton county, Ontario, on October 2, 1876, so he is now only thirty-nine years old. Though a Canadian by birth he is an American citizen. His family consists of a wife and young daughter, Virginia.

George Gordon Moore, the American traction man whose intimacy with Sir John French, the British commander, has gained him a freedom at the British headquarters "somewhere in France" that is causing criticism and wonderment in England, has come to this country to look after his extensive interests in and about Detroit, Mich.

At the Hotel Manhattan yesterday Mr. Moore denied that his leaving the continent was concerned with recent articles in London and New York newspapers intimating that Sir John French was showing the American friend too great consideration. He said that there was friction between the British commander and Lord Kitchener.

"Sir John French is a great general," he said with enthusiasm, "a very great general. Lord Kitchener is a great war secretary. Both too good for the British to be squabbling. I left the British headquarters—no, I cannot say just where—two weeks ago. At that time there most certainly was no ill feeling. Sir John French and Lord Kitchener were the best of friends. Sir John's only enemies are the Germans. Aren't they enough?"

Impression His Looks Give

Mr. Moore looks almost anything but the remarkably successful business man, lawyer and promoter that he is. One gets the impression of an Englishman living on his income rather than of a man who two years ago, at the age of thirty-seven, and so successfully managed many American corporations that he could retire from active business. He was admitted to the bar when twenty-one and is a principal owner of public utilities in Michigan, Georgia, Nebraska, Canada and Brazil.

This man, who is so close to the great British field commander is below middle height, quiet of manner and with a soft, almost leaping, voice, and possessed of a most contagious and omnipresent smile. This is the face of a man rather fond of the good things of life, not one who is the bosom friend of the general commanding nobody knows how many hundreds of thousands of fighting men.

It was difficult to imagine such a man, with his soft voice, white hands, his almost chubby face and even, "white teeth," spending almost all his time near scenes of war and exerting no small influence in the conduct of the British campaign. It seems strange also that Mr. Moore and Sir John French, until the war began, should have lived together in a large house at Lancaster Gate, overlooking Kensington Gardens. They were so inseparable that the American has been with the English general almost constantly at the front. Mr. Moore explains it in this wise:

"Yes, Sir John French and I live together. I see nothing strange in that. I think a great deal of him and I hope the feeling is mutual. When the war began Sir John asked me to visit him in

zation of the water power corporation in Georgia with more than \$200,000 capital, and again Mr. Moore's name appeared as chairman of the board of directors.

More recent was the amalgamation of Pacific coast utilities with an enormous capitalization. Mr. Moore, spending months on this project before the outbreak of the war.

On the other side of the Atlantic there is the Investment Registry, an organization operating in the same field as Lloyd's and in this Mr. Moore is one of the guiding spirits.

He made a trip to Brazil penetrated far into the interior and is now at the head of a corporation which has valuable grants and eventually intends to promote a gigantic water power.

Through all this Mr. Moore has done little talking and none when publicity would result. His movements have been swift. He is a man of tremendous nervous energy and seems never to tire, although he now has very widespread interests. In the Canadian Northwest he has a vast cattle range; controls the traction company at Lincoln, Neb., a water power in Texas and another in Vermont.

Although he has been tremendously busy he has found time for recreation and is a sportsman with many fancies. He plays polo, tennis and other outdoor games, and is an expert rifle shot. It is said that during his Brazilian trip when among the half civilized natives he shot the bill of a bird after telling them through an interpreter of his intention, and thereafter they regarded him as supernatural.

The friendship between Mr. Moore and Sir John French is of several years standing. Always they were together when in London and a couple of years ago when the Balkan trouble threatened to cause international difficulties and the War Office was the scene of a continuous performance he was with the Field Marshal day and night. At that time General French promised him a view of a battle if ever he commanded troops taking part in one, little dreaming then of the retreat from Mons and the death struggles so near at hand.

Gen. French called to Mr. Moore early in the war and the latter left for London and then for the front. It is understood that he has been going back and forth at will since then. Also there have been rumors that the cabinet upheaval in England was the outcome of certain information which he gave and this gave rise to the question: "Why is an American civilian given privileges which no Englishman can have?"

General French's private saddle horse is the young stallion Goyard, which was bred at Mr. Moore's Dromore Farm, Frank S. Cooke, a newspaper man of Detroit bought the colt when a yearling and won all the blue ribbons in the ring at the Michigan State Fair in 1913 and 1914, the last being when the colt was a year-old.

Mr. Moore had been looking for what he considered the handsomest horse in America to present to Gen. French, and Goyard filling the requirements as far as looks were concerned and also being an apt pupil when put under a saddle, Mr. Moore bought the horse back. The colt was shipped and arrived at Tilbury dock London, in November of last year. It is understood that Sir John uses the colt in England but did not take him to France.

Mr. Moore gave up his Detroit house almost two years ago and moved to New York, but for several months his family has been at the country estate in St. Clair, while he has been in England and France.

When a boy studied law, was admitted to the bar as soon as he attained his majority and soon became prominent in corporation law. It was that branch of the profession which brought him in touch with the Michigan United Traction Company, the system having only eighteen miles of trackage at that time. He merged the interests of urban and interurban lines and built up the Michigan United Traction Company with 350 miles of track, then sold it to an eastern corporation incidentally making millions for himself.

A few years ago there appeared in trade papers something about the acquisition of 100,000 acres of virgin forest in North Carolina, with Mr. Moore as chairman of the board. Not long afterwards came the final step in the organization.

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
