

STRESEMAN OPTIMISTIC OF NEAR FUTURE

Sees Europe's Reconstruction
Assured on Germany's
Entry to League

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—"The last three or four years in Europe, have been the overture to a play which is now beginning," Dr. Gustav Stresemann, the German Foreign Minister remarked to the newspaper correspondents, last night, in alluding to the significance of Germany's formal entry into the League of Nations. "I hope that play will lead to the reconstruction of Europe, so necessary after all that Europe has suffered during the horrible war."

Dr. Stresemann declared that this reconstruction was only possible by co-operation and good faith. Referring to the March crisis, when Germany failed to elect to the league, the minister said they had all witnessed what they all felt to be a disaster, yet had left Geneva in the hope that all would be settled.

"I am gratified," he added, "that the policy, which moved by way of Locarno and led to Geneva, has proved so successful."

AMHERST, Sept. 9.—Premier J. B. N. Baxter of New Brunswick, tonight spoke before 1,200 people, in the first mass meeting of the campaign held here in the Liberal-Conservative candidate, Robert K. BANDITS BESTED BY TEXAS RANGERS

Pair Surprised While Robbing
Clarksville Bank and Are
Slain

CLARKSVILLE, Tex., Sept. 10.—Two bank robbers met two Texas rangers yesterday. Both bandits are dead.

The robbers were surprised when they attempted to flee from the Red River National Bank here, with several thousand dollars in currency.

Ranger Capt. Tom Hickman, who was outside the bank, called upon the men to drop a suitcase containing the loot, when they started for their automobile. One of the men attempted to draw a pistol, Hickman said. The ranger captain, Ranger Stuart Stanley and Constable Ivy opened fire and the robbers fell mortally wounded.

U. S. SHIPS FIRED ON

Destroyers Attacked on Yang-
tze River and Two Soldiers
Wounded

SHANGHAI, Sept. 10.—A telegram received here from Hankow says, the United States torpedo boat destroyers Stewart and Pope which arrived at Hankow last Friday, encountered rifle and machine gun fire 50 miles down the Yangtze River. The dispatch added that two soldiers on the United States boats were wounded.

Another report received from Hankow says every foreign steamer entering or leaving port is made the target for the bullets of the Cantonese soldiers. Several British and Japanese ships are declared to have been badly riddled.
