

## IZZIE AND MOE HAD VERY LIVELY TIME

Had to Chop Down Three Doors, But Got the Boozie.

New York, Oct. 24.—A new scheme to obtain evidence of violations of the Volstead act was uncovered Wednesday afternoon by Iszy Einstein and Moe Smith, prohibition agents, when two men were released in \$500 bail each by United States Commissioner Boyle on a charge of selling liquor at 180 Greenway street. The defendants are Robert Brown, alleged proprietor of the place, which Einstein said was known as "Peter's Restaurant," and Frank Wilson, a waiter.

"Several weeks ago," Einstein explained, "R. C. Merrick, divisional chief at prohibition headquarters, asked us to see what we could do about several places in the vicinity of the financial district suspected of being 'speakeasies.' This restaurant was one of them. We started for it right away. We tried to get in under disguise, but the fellow at the door winked and said: 'Take 'em off, I know you.' We tried several other disguises, but each time the fellow only laughed at our disguises and wouldn't let us in.

Determined to get in, we said to ourselves, 'We'll get in there' and last Saturday we hung out in the neighborhood for hours, and that's what led to our getting the evidence. A man came out. He had a small package under his arm. I bumped against him. The package fell to the street. I said: 'Excuse me; I'll help you to pick it up.' He said: 'It's no use; it's gone.' He said it was whisky, so I picked up the bottom of the bottle, which contained a small amount of liquor, as evidence. When I offered to buy him another bottle, he said he got it inside. That was enough for us. We got a search warrant and descended on the place at noon today.

There is a sort of room in the front, containing chairs and tables, you know, like a restaurant," continued Iszy. "But as we stepped in from the street a large bell began to ring furiously in the back, behind a thick partition. We tried to go through, but we could not budge the door. We had to chop it down, and then two other doors, all of which were reinforced with steel.

"But we worked on those doors and banged them down. When we got to the back room about fifty people, fellows who appeared to be clerks and business men out for lunch, were seated there. We found Brown in there and we also found a suitcase full of whisky and gin. We arrested Brown. As we were leaving with him through the front door Wilson came in. He had another suitcase. We looked inside the thing and found it also was filled with liquor. We arrested him too."

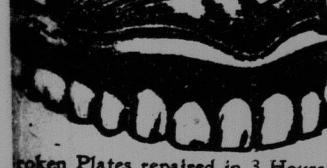

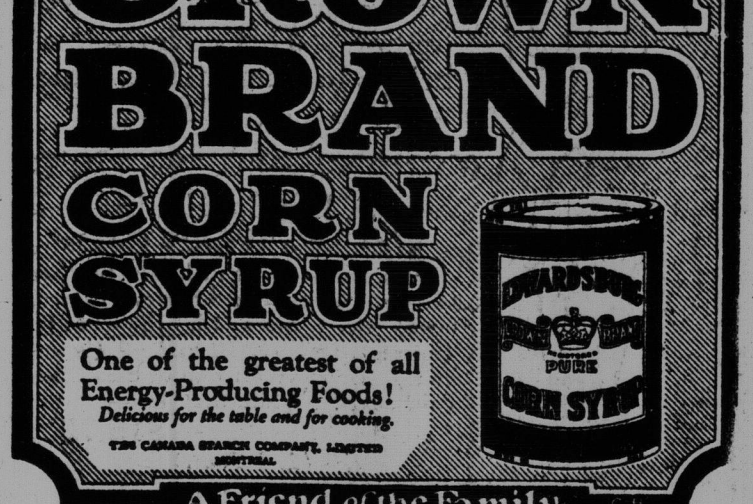

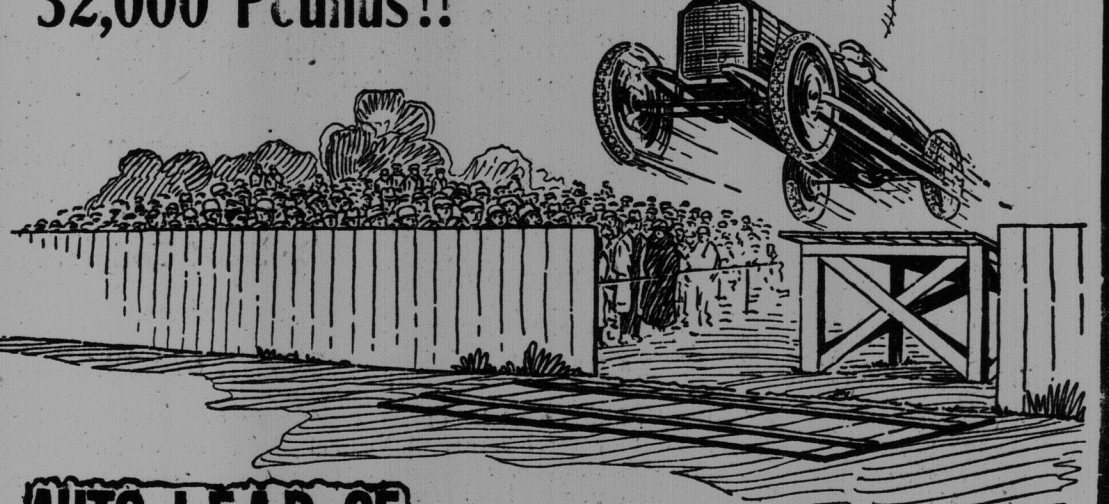
