## EARNING CAPACITY OF GRADUATES

(New York World.) Among the college statistics now du

in connection with the Commencement season the figures made public at Princeton, showing the earning capacity of the class of 1912, will no doubt excite a special interest. Members of this class, according to their answers to a questionnaire, received an average income last year of \$6,750. The largest income reported was \$50,000, which was raade by a manufacturer, and the lowest was \$3,525, which was earned by a tencher.

The significance of these statistics, of course, is that they express the precical results of a college education in terms of money. By that test Princeton, a university of high academic ideals, must rank in the forefront also of American institutions of a higher utilitarian education. Harvard, Yale and Columbia are yet to report on this particular phase of academic efficiency. But certainly a college which can exhibit a class with average annual earnings of \$6,750 ten years after graduation has justified itself of its curriculum. This is well above the average income reported for income taxation and represents a superior earning capacity in college men thirty-two years of age.
