### 43 DIE, 27 HURT IN MINE BLAST IN GERMANY

Comrades Prove Heroes in  
Rescuing Bodies and  
Saving Injured

MANY OVERCOME BY  
POISONOUS GASES

Rescuers Work for Twenty-  
Four Hours Without  
Taking Respite.

DORSTFELD, Germany, May 18.—  
The number of known dead in the mine  
explosion here Saturday has now reached  
43, with 27 injured.

The work of the trapped miners' com-  
rades in recovering the dead bodies  
and rescuing the wounded consti-  
tutes one of the heroic pages in the  
mining history of this region. The ap-  
proach to the victims was both diffi-  
cult and dangerous. Oxygen apparatus  
could not be carried on the backs of the  
rescuers, but had to be dragged with  
difficulty through narrow passages.

A copy of the proposed contract be-  
tween the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., and  
the Maritime Electric Company has  
been received by the New Brunswick  
Board of Public Utilities and the board  
of Public Utilities and the board  
are asked to approve of this contract  
Under the agreement the Canadian Cot-  
tons will sell current to the Maritime  
Electric for distribution in the Town  
of St. Stephen.

Under the agreement the Canadian Cottons agree to sell the Maritime Electric Company a minimum of 2,000,000 k.w.h. and for any amount in excess of 2,000,000 k.w.h. the Maritime Electric Company will pay to the Canadian Cottons a minimum sum of \$50,000 yearly. The current will be delivered to the company at a voltage of 2300.
