ST. JOHN'S INTERESTS

Mr. Pigeon's speech last evening on the subject of Canadian transportation. In that speech he gained a clear knowledge of broad and progressive policy of the Government. It is a policy that has already produced marvellous results in the development and the benefits which will now be increasingly shared by the Atlantic ports, and especially the St. John, where almost \$2,000,000 has been expended in the harbor in four years, and the further expenditure of millions is already provided for.

THE CASE FAIRLY STATED

In which the people of St. John are most interested in connection with the trade agreement is the effect upon the maritime provinces. It is shown that so far as east coast trade is concerned, and the business winter port, these will not be all affected. What have we in these provinces that would be benefited by the agreement? Reciprocity would bring new capital into this Province and develop our natural resources. Reciprocity would afford a better market for our farmers and for the fishermen along our coast. I am more and more persuaded that this is the best measure that has been submitted to the people of Nova Scotia since Confederation and for my own part I am going to support it."
