MANY ATTEND THE INQUEST

Jury Says Pardi Costantine's Death Was Caused by Being Struck With Stone.

From Wednesday's Daily.
The deceased, Pardi Costantine, came to his death in the yards of the C. P. R. in the town of Ingersoll, Ontario, from the effects of being struck on the head with a stone, thrown by a person unknown to us.

The above verdict was brought in by the coroner's jury at the inquest held last night in connection with the death of Pardi Costantine, the Italian who was killed in the C. P. R. yards on Sunday afternoon. When Coroner Neff opened the inquest the council chamber was packed to the doors. Many were present, no doubt, to get a look at the man under arrest for throwing the stone. In this they were disappointed, as the prisoner was being given his preliminary trial before Magistrate Morrison in the police court room. Only three witnesses were examined—Pardi Lucigi, brother of deceased, to identify the victim; Dr. Coleridge, who performed the post mortem, and Charlie Pilon, a sixteen-year-old boy, who saw the stone thrown.

Pardi Lucigi, through an interpreter, informed the jury and coroner that the victim of the stone throwing

was his brother, Pardi Costantine. Incidentally he told those present that his brother had been a "great man" in Italy and had been five years on the police force. When asked if he knew anything about the cause of his brother's death, the witness replied that he did not.

Dr. Coleridge was the next witness. After reading the report of his post mortem examination, giving the conditions in which he found the body, witness concluded his evidence by saying: "From the above conditions, I am of the opinion that deceased came to his death from shock, the result of external violence in the nature of a blow from a blunt instrument, and that death followed within a few minutes after the injury."

Charlie Pilon was the next witness, and he gave evidence as follows: "On Sunday afternoon about 4.30 o'clock I was walking on the C. P. R. track from Wingham street towards the station. About half way towards Wingham street and the station I saw three cars containing Italians, three of whom were playing with coppers. These three Italians were quiet. I stood and watched them play for a while. Then I started to walk away. When I got near the C. P. R. station I heard some hollering, when I turned and went back. I stood and watched them talking for about two minutes, in which an old man, standing outside the car door, talking very roughly, I thought, to a younger man, threw a big piece of coal at the young man standing in the car door. The young man jumped out of the car, caught the older man and held him with his hands behind his back. Another young man about the same age went up and spoke to the young man. He let go of the older man and walked away. The second young man

ran away with another one. After this a tall man, with a pair of faded overalls on, a slouch hat and no coat, seized a big piece of stone and threw it at the man and hit him on the back of the head. The big man then went into the first car and immediately after came out again, then walked into the second car, and when he came out he had a black coat on. He then ran down the track towards the Wingham street crossing. I went to the station and told Mr. Enright to call Chief Wright and Dr. Neff. The deceased, on being struck with the stone, fell on the track, pressing his head with his hand. Some Italians pulled the body off the track. By this time the Coroner was on the scene. The man never moved after he fell."

To the Coroner—"I watched the man for about two or three minutes, during which time he never moved." Coroner Neff then addressed the jury, pointing out that it was their duty to return a verdict according to the evidence given. The doctor stated that, in his opinion, there was no room for two opinions as to the cause of death. Dr. Coleridge had stated that he was positive that the injury to the skull would cause death. Charlie Pilon had sworn positively that he saw the man throw the stone, saw the deceased struck and saw him fall. The Coroner concluded by saying, "There is no need of hesitating as to your verdict. I now leave the matter with you."

The council chamber was then cleared of spectators and after considering the evidence the jury returned their verdict as above.

Hamilton's health report last week is five cases of scarlet fever, one of diphtheria and two of chickenpox.

WANTS SPECIMENS

COLLECTION OF SPECIES FOUND IN INTERNATIONAL WATERS.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—A complete collection of the fish inhabiting the waterways dividing the United States and Canada is now being made on behalf of the International Fisheries Commission. Mr. S. E. Meek, of the Field Museum, Chicago, was at the King Edward Hotel yesterday, after having spent several weeks along the Great Lakes. He will leave for Kingston this morning, and visit several other points along the shores of Lake Ontario. The members of the Fish Commission found last summer that there were many more common names for fish than there were species, and confusion resulted from the great variety. Mr. Meek was therefore asked to make a collection, and is securing several specimens of each species in order that he may have a set for the Leland Stanford University, one for the Canadian National Museum, and one for the Field Museum. He visited Ward's Island yesterday, and was fortunate enough to arrive just as the fishermen came in with their nets, thereby securing good specimens of almost every fish that is caught in these waters. The fish are preserved in formaldehyde, and shipped to Chicago. Mr. Meek began his work at the Lake of the Woods, and expects to complete it next week. The Fish Commission, which was composed of Dr. Jordan, of Stanford University, and Mr. S. F. Bastedo, is now engaged in compiling its report in California. It is to be ready by the first of January.

HIS WAGON UPSET

BRUCE COUNTY FARMER KILLED WHILE DRIVING HOME.

Kincardine, Ont., Nov. 2.—John Martin, a well known blacksmith of Ripley, lost his life on Saturday. Deceased was driving home with a load of coal from Kincardine, in the dark, when the wagon upset in the ditch. The load fell upon Mr. Martin, and when he was taken out it was found that life was extinct.

He was about 60 years of age, and leaves a widow and grown-up family.

GRAND TRUNK METHODS

CALL FOR IMMEDIATE REFORM, SAYS MORNING POST.

London, Nov. 2.—Remarkable observations of a correspondent, who states that were the G. T.
