- A. I never saw him hand it of him. I know he was paid.
- Q. How long, at a time, would he be residing on this lot 158?
- A. I really could not tell you. I know he was there for years. These gentlement know better than I do.
- Q. If he was there for years he could not have been working for your father?
- A. In the winter time he would live at his own house and come across the river and work for my father.
- Q. What about the summertime?
- A. Sometimes he would come up there and bring his wife with him and stay there and work with us.
- Q. At time he did odd jobs for your father, it was not a continuous employment?
- A. He was continually there for years. First, but not all the time.
- Q. Surely you are not prepared to swear that your father baid him for any time at all he was engaged on this particular lot, you are not prepared to say that he was paid for the actual time that he was residing on this lot?

Commissioner-

- Q. That is, did your father pay him wages when he was living on the lot and not working with him?
- A. No, he only paid him when he was working for him?

Mr. Clarke;

- Q. And he never paid Mr. Truthwaite, your father, any rent for this place?
- A. I could not say, I do not think it.
- Q. He swore to that, that he did not pay any rent, at the commission, I understand. You never heard of your father denying it?
- A. I have heard.
- Q. Your father was he an Indians? A. No.
- Q. He did not take Treaty? A. Oh, no.
