When Will War End

The best judges of the situation affirm that Germany can last only six months or a year longer. If Roumania would join the central powers the Allies would be forced to wage the same kind of war for about three months longer.

It was intended to postpone the British parliament elections to six months after the war, but this was reduced to three and dissolution is not to take place till eight months from February. This would appear to prove that the British Government estimates that Germany will be defeated in about six or seven months.

Whether the first break in the German lines will come in the west, or in the east, is impossible to say. Both French, British, Russians and Italians are putting on machinery and eventually the strain will be so severe that a snap in the German line of battle will come somewhere and it will be the beginning of the end. Probably there will be a general retreat of the Germans to start things moving. Matters are expected to remain moderately quiet in France till March. The Germans, however, may attempt another offensive before the Allies decide to strike.—Orange Sentinel.

Hans Schmidt Goes to Chair

Ossining, N.Y., Jan. 14.—Hans Schmidt, the priest convicted of murdering Anna Ammeller and throwing her body in the Hudson River after dismembering it, was to have been electrocuted in the death house at Sing Sing penitentiary here today.

Schmidt is the man who told his attorney he wanted to die in the electric chair in the hope that his innocence would afterward be established and capital punishment thereby stopped.

It was on Sept. 5th, 1913, that the upper part of Anna Ammeller's dismembered body was found in the river off Woodcliff, N. J. Ten days afterward, by persistent work on the part of Police Inspector Faurot the mystery was solved to the satisfaction of the police.

The body was identified as that of a former servant in the rectory of St. Boniface's Church, and Schmidt who, for three years, had been performing the functions of a priest in the rectory of St. Joseph's Church.

On the day of his arrest the priest made a full confession in which he admitted that he killed the girl and cut her body into nine pieces. His statement on that occasion was so startling that his sanity was questioned, and experts were called by the State. A month later they pronounced him sane and shamming insanity. For alienists were then called by the defense. After several examinations they went on the stand at his two trials, the one in December, 1913, and the other in February, 1914, and swore that he was in curably insane.

The War Situation

Strife continues about the same in Belgium and France, although there has been increased activity with flying machines. German Airships visited England during the week and dropped a few bombs, but did a little damage.

The Russians are still continuing their offensive on both the southern and northern fronts. In the Caucasus they are driving back the Turks in disorder and taking thousands of prisoners. The situation around Salonika remains quiet. The Montenegrans are still being forced back by the Austrians. The Serbian Army is reorganizing at Corfu.

General Townshend's army is still surrounded by the Turks at Kut-el-Amara, while General Aylmer and a Russian detachment are striving to relieve them. Floods have prevented operations.

German East Africa is all but conquered. Some German officers and soldiers have fled into Spanish territory.

Not much doing on the Italian front, owing no doubt to the severity of the weather. The British fleet is still doing business as usual in the North Sea. The German fleet are still on forlough in the Kiel Canal. Reports say they are planning 17-inch guns on their battleships, but this don't seem to worry Balfour, head of the British Admiralty.
