"On the day after the fight at Viakfontein, May 29, Lieut. Hearn told him that while lying on the ground wounddwelling, she exclaimed: Mother, all is over with me now; but I have saved my brother and sister! She expired expired twenty four hours after. October 15, 1869, aged 12 years. Greater love no man hath known. On the side of the stone is insorthed: This memorial was erected by the legislature of Nova Scotia."—Montreal Witness.

LONDON, July 23.—Mail advices received here today from St. Petersburg give details of the expulsion from Russia of George Kennan, the American author.

Mr. Kennan arrived at St. Petersburg three weeks ago after an absence of fifteen years. He entered the country by way of Finland on an American passport. The Russian press referred to Mr. Kennan's return courteously, no paper suggesting that he was not welcome. Thursday evening a high police official placed him under detention in his room and read a notice requiring Mr. Kennan's departure by 10 o'clock the field night.
