In spite of the fact that the Inter-Society Baseball League was organized in good time, plans for the summer's diamond enterprise are practically as intangible as they were in January.

The situation is now shaping, the Society League is about due for dissolution. This is chiefly due to the difficulties as to that important feature of the game—grounds on which to play.

Mr. Heaney Wants 60 Per Cent. Since negotiations were opened with Manager Heaney, all four clubs in the Society League have arrived at the conclusion that it will be impossible to make arrangements for the grounds.

It is understood that the management will not lease the grounds for less than sixty per cent. of the gate receipts. At that, the field is not fit for fast ball, as it has been allowed to deteriorate for several years past.

With the situation as outlined above the Inter-Society League teams now favor the formation of a city league irrespective of any past organization.
