### IN THE COURTS

PROBATE.

In the probate court yesterday the will of Lancelot A. Curry, barrister-at-law, was proved without waiting the usual lapse of fourteen days. This was for special cause. He gives all his estate real and personal, to Arthur P. Hazen, of Montreal, banker, and his sister, R. Eliza Curry, of St. John in trust to hold the same and to supply the income for the support and education of his children according to their best judgment, giving them power to sell any part of his personal property and lease or sell fee simple, any part of his real estate, and on the youngest attaining the age of 21 years, to divide the estate equally amongst the children.

Should either of his daughters marry with the consent of the trustees or either of his sons desire to have a college education, the trustees are authorized to take from the corpus of the estate for either of such purposes, not exceeding for each child, \$1,000, charging the amount against the child. He nominated the trustees executors, and they were accordingly sworn in as such. Real estate consists of the Star Line wharf at Fredericton valued at \$2,000; freehold dwelling 138 Charlotte street, valued at \$5,000; freehold country residence at Woodman's Point, about three acres, valued at \$500—the whole valued at \$10,000. Personal property is set down for the present at \$20,000 subject to increase. Fred R. Taylor is proctor.

Arbitration Matter.

In the matter of the arbitration of P. Byron Bull vs. The St. John and Quebec Railway Company in connection with lands taken for railway purposes, Francis Kerr, acting for W. P. Jones, K.C., yesterday morning obtained from Mr. Justice McKeown, a summons on appeal from the award of the two arbitrators. The summons is returnable on January 25.

## TAX ASSESSMENT

### WAS TOO HEAVY

Partington Company to Get Rebate of Amount Levied on Assessment in Excess of \$225,000.

The assessment committee of the county council held a meeting yesterday afternoon to consider a complaint by the Partington Pulp Company that they had been over assessed. Messrs. H. W. Schofield and T. McAvity were present on behalf of the company. They contended that the assessment of the company had been fixed by act of legislature at \$225,000, but that the assessors of the Parish of Lancaster had placed a valuation of about \$250,000 on their properties. The assessors who were present said they had been of the opinion that the exemption granted the company did not apply to the Cushing property which is now owned by the Partington people.

The representatives of the company said that they owned the Cushing property at the time the act was passed, granting them an exemption on all property valuation above \$225,000, and that consequently the act applied to the Cushing property.

After discussing the matter for some time the committee came to the conclusion that the assessors' intention of taxing the property was not the proper one, and they decided to recommend the county council to grant the Partington company a rebate in excess of \$25,000.

No other matters came before the meeting.

## NEWS IN SHORT METRE

LOCAL.

Inland Revenue.

The revenues in the customs house show an encouraging increase over 1911. For the year ended on Tuesday 1912 the total was \$20,980.41. The total for 1912 is \$91,715,967.84. The inland revenue receipts for December were \$20,582.34, a decrease of \$3,397.07. The total for 1912 was \$21,290,111, an increase of \$1,432.72.

Savings Bank.

Considering the fact that the season of Christmas giving intervened, the deposits made at the government savings bank for December are not so very far behind the withdrawals. There were deposits of \$7,825.04, and withdrawals of \$9,131.03.

Are Moving.

The broom department of T. S. Simms and Company, Ltd., commenced work in their new factory at Lancaster yesterday. The plant is being moved from the present factory in Union street one department at a time, and it may be about a month before all the departments are at work in the new structure.

Presentations.

In the post office on New Year's eve Robert Guild, porter, was remembered by the clerks, who presented him with a purse of gold. J. S. Plagor made the presentation on behalf of the clerks. Joseph Klervan, of Indian town, was pleasantly remembered on New Year's eve by several friends, who made a presentation of a purse of gold to him in the office of John McGoldrick, Smythe street. The presentation was made by Dr. D. J. Mullin.

Buckets Found.

The dredging buckets which were lost in the harbor from the government dredge Fielding, were located by a diver this morning, and the dredge Stoneliff was taken to the place and anchored there. If the weather continues favorable a start will be made on the work of lifting the buckets this afternoon.

Fredericton, Jan. 2.—Garnet Love, of Gibson, aged 30, met a tragic death at the L. C. R. station here at 11 o'clock last night. He was boarding the suburban train for his home, and slipping on the icy pavement, fell headlong to the rails. The train was in motion, but was almost instantly stopped by the driver who had seen the accident, but the wheel of a car had passed over Love's neck. He expired within a few minutes.

## ANNUAL MEETING

### OF OPERA HOUSE

### CO. LAST EVENING

Changes in Officers and Directors—Company will Pay Six per cent Dividend and Four per cent Bonus.

Matters in connection with the St. John Opera House Company reached a new and interesting stage at the annual meeting last evening, when for the first time in many years, the shareholders voted on the amount of stock they held instead of the one man vote plan, which had been ordinarily followed.

As a result of the change Mr. R. H. Dockrill, equipped with the voting power of 3,100 shares of stock, 3,000 of which were in his own name, and 100 which he voted as proxy for Mrs. Katherine Maher deposited a ballot which had been prepared in advance, and which, in printed form was distributed to the shareholders present, and thereby introduced several new men to the directorate and an almost completely new set of officers.

A. O. Skinner, who had been president of the company, and was prominent in connection with its organization years ago, was not present. S. B. Gerow, second vice president, occupied the chair until the arrival of Dr. G. A. B. Addy, first vice president. After the routine business had been finished the report of the directors was presented.

The house had in its history, and it was decided to declare a dividend of six per cent, with a bonus of four per cent, to all stockholders of record, payable on February 1st, 1913.

The committee appointed to revise the by-laws of the company reported and in the new by-laws introduced the principle of voting on the shares, and the by-laws were adopted. It was decided to have 500 copies of the new by-laws printed and distributed to the shareholders.

The election of officers resulted in the following slate being placed in nomination:

For president, R. H. Dockrill; first vice-president, S. B. Gerow; second vice-president, John Mitchell. Directors: T. A. Linton, D. Connell, John Ross, H. J. Anderson, E. W. Paul, T. L. Reed, P. J. Mooney.

Some one nominated R. J. Armstrong for a director. On the one man vote principle Mr. Armstrong would have been elected, but as the election was conducted on the number of shares held, and as he was not on the slate he was beaten.

At the directors' meeting which followed R. H. Dockrill, S. B. Gerow and E. W. Paul were elected to the committee of management; John Ross was chosen treasurer and H. J. Anderson, a former manager of the house, was elected secretary.

While the shareholders are pleased that through the leasing of the house to Mr. P. G. Spencer, which was done last year, the company declared the first dividend in its history, and must now be considered as a paying proposition, it is reported there is some opposition to the method in which the election of directors was conducted. One of the shareholders said after the meeting "there is no use in attending an annual meeting when one man can control it and elect a slate which has been previously agreed upon."

No opposition, however, was made apparent at the meeting.
