Such a certified bank cheque or cash will be returned to the parties whose tenders are not accepted, but with the party whose tender is accepted, it shall be retained until the amount of contract is paid.

CHURCH AT MILLERTON REOPENED

Repairs and Re-decoration Completed—Handsome New Window in Memory of a Former Pastor.

Millerton, N. S., Dec. 8.—The little church of St. Peter, Derby, one of the oldest in the Miramichi, was re-opened on Sunday after having been in the hands of carpenters and painters for the past few weeks.

The Holy Communion service was celebrated at 11 o'clock by the rector, the Rev. E. Tully Montgomery, who preached from the text—"The House of God; and this is the gate of Heaven" (Gen. xxviii. 17, laying emphasis upon the original and real purpose of a church, and how that due reverence should be shown at all times to God's house. During the offertory Master James Best rendered very beautifully "Ye Year Hearer," from "Elijah."

The Ven. Archdeacon Forsythe, of Chatham, was the special preacher at the evening service. In the course of his sermon, which was of a very interesting retrospective nature, he spoke of his first visit to St. Peter's, Derby, some forty years ago, and went on to review the many changes that parish since then. He also paid glowing tributes to the non-hearted missionaries who had done such noble pioneer work along the Miramichi in the early days.

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GOOD YEAR FOR BIBLE SOCIETY IN NEWCASTLE

Annual Meeting Held Monday—Work of Branch Reviewed—Returns for year in Excess of 1912.

Newcastle, Dec. 9.—The annual meeting of the Newcastle Branch of the Canadian Bible Society was held last night, in the Baptist Sunday School room. Addresses were given by Rev. Dr. Cousins, chairman, and Rev. S. J. MacArthur, and Mrs. James Davidson read extracts from Bishop Richardson's charge to the Anglican church, distributed here on Sunday, urging co-operation of Anglicans with the Bible Society on whom they had to depend for 100 of the 184 translations of the Bible their missionaries needed in the foreign field. The S. P. C. K. could not do the work of the Bible Society, and the Bible Society furnishes a platform upon which Anglicans can meet and co-operate with other denominations to the advantage of each.

Dr. Cousins said that besides the 100 translations for the Anglicans the Bible Society gave 130 translations to the Presbyterians, 90 to the Methodists and 60 to the Baptists.
