To be divided among Red Cross, Belgian Relief and Patriotic Funds - Additional grant for Scott Act Work.

Hardland, N. B., Jan. 20.—What might have been a tragedy, but fortunately resulted only in a scalp wound, occurred here on Monday, the parties to the affair being two small boys. While playing together an altercation took place and young Arthur McNeill seized an axe struck young Mark Gillin, son of Mr. Ed. Gillin, on the head, inflicting a severe scalp wound. The young fellow fainted two or three times while being conveyed to his home, where Dr. Macintosh attended and dressed the wound. The youngsters were not seriously hurt, but some boyish prank angered the little McNeill fellow and resulted as above. The Gillin boy is in no danger but the wound is painful and he is doing as well as can be expected.

Mr. Herman Shaw of Coldstream has been removed to the hospital at Woodstock where an operation was performed and he is now on a fair way for recovery.

CRIMINAL CASES IN CIRCUIT COURT. The trial of the case of the King vs. Louis Jones was commenced yesterday morning in the circuit court before Mr. Justice Barry and the following jury: Hiram Webb, Samuel A. Thorne, Thos. S. Banks, Gordon C. Smith, John O'Brien, Nelson, N. B. G. S. Lovell, Barton, T. L. Brown, DeLoft, Ireland, C. Angus, Quebec; I. A. Grant, L. Col. Halifax.

Jones was indicted on a charge of assaulting James Blizard with intent to do grievous bodily harm. He pleaded not guilty. Blizard and his own testified and Jones spoke in his own behalf, and May Miller also gave evidence for the defence.

Police Officer Charles H. Rankine, Ex-Chief W. Walker Clark and Deputy Chief Jenkins were called by the crown in rebuttal. U. J. Sweeney who appeared for the defendant addressed the jury.

After counsel and his honor had addressed the jury the body retired and shortly after three o'clock returned a verdict of guilty. The prisoner was then sentenced to thirty days in the common gaol without the option of a fine.

Judson Dryden, who was convicted on Wednesday on the charge of assaulting Denis Kelher, occasioning grievous bodily harm, was sentenced in two months in the common gaol without the option of a fine.

The court then adjourned.

French War Office Denies German Success Near Notre Dame De Lorette.

Paris, Jan. 21.—An official denial of the reported German success near Notre Dame De Lorette was issued here today.

The War Office states that the German attack at this point, which is northwest of Arras, was repulsed completely and that a company of German soldiers was captured.

The German official statement of yesterday said that a trench 200 yards long at Notre Dame De Lorette was taken. Today's German statement, however, says that these trenches were recaptured by the Allies.

MUST REPORT HOW MANY SOLDIERS IN UNIFORM ENTER THEIR BARS

Order promulgated by Government with view to securing sobriety among troops.

Toronto, Jan. 21.—The government has issued the following statement, signed by Endo Saunders, the chief licence inspector, to the hotels of the province: "Owing to the statements which have been made, more or less publicly, that a considerable number of men wearing the King's uniform may be seen drinking in bars, the provincial secretary thinks it desirable to secure a report showing to what extent this is true, and you are requested to supply the department with the most accurate information you can as to the number of men in uniform, if any, who enter your bar daily. This report should extend over a week at least."

"This request is not intended as a reflection upon the propriety of the troops, but it is important to show to what extent the statement is true. It need scarcely be said that the department is fully alive to the importance of the subject, and is prepared to take any action which may be necessary to aid in securing the utmost sobriety of the troops, and it is of course expected that every licensee holder in the province will co-operate with the department to this end."

HAS GIVEN UP HOPE OF MISSING EXPLORERS

Edmonton, Jan. 21.—Captain Robert Karlik, commander of the steamer Karlik, which carried the Stefansson expedition to the Arctic, expressed the belief today that the eight missing explorers of the expedition perished long ago.

These eight men set out last February from the ice and the Karlik was crushed in the ice, and headed for Wrangell Island, 80 miles distant," he said. "They never reached the island. As I remember, it came up stormy shortly after they left the camp of the main party. The men had neither proper supplies nor experience in Arctic work to carry them safely through all the months since February, 1914. They perished, without doubt."

NURSES FOR THE FRONT. Miss F. Armstrong and Miss E. K. Moody, 11 Orange street, having been accepted as nurses for the front in the Army Service Corps, have received orders to proceed to Halifax on Monday. Miss Alice Thompson, of the "Chance Harbor," is also going to the front as a nurse, as is Miss Hegan, daughter of Geo. B. Hegan, who has just received official notification of a Frederickian despatch to the Globe.

Miss Joyce Wishart, who is at present nursing Mrs. Herbert Maxwell, George street, has been accepted as a nurse for duty with overseas medical service with the British troops. Miss Wishart offered her services some weeks ago, and this morning received a telegram from Ottawa notifying her that she had been accepted. Miss Wishart has made her home with Capt. Wishart at St. Martin's, N. B., and is a graduate nurse of the General Public Hospital at St. John. She is daughter of Mr. Allison Wishart, formerly of the Bank of New Brunswick, and now residing in Halifax.

During the past three years she has been engaged in nursing. She will perform any and all duties which may be required of her with other nurses who are to sail from Canada in February.

Several of participants cut and bruised—Police make four arrests.

Boston, Jan. 21.—There was a street fight between striking and non-union garment workers in Haywood Place today. Several of the participants were cut and bruised, but no one was dangerously injured. Four arrests were made. Two men were sent to a hospital for treatment as a result of similar disturbances.

SOLDIERS WHO SHOT AMERICAN POACHERS RELEASED ON BAIL

Welland, Ont., Jan. 21.—Corporal Archie Kaye and Privates Kinsman and Macintosh, of the Forty-Fourth Canadian Infantry, charged with manslaughter in connection with the shooting of Walter Smith, the American duck hunter at Fort Erie, December 28, were released from Welland jail on \$60,000 bail today. The men at once joined their company at Bridgeburg.

Eight Welland merchants provided the surety.

ALBERTA FARMERS FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Edmonton, Jan. 21.—The United Farmers of Alberta this afternoon endorsed the principle of suffrage for women, and asked the government to submit a plebiscite on the question. They also favored granting women a legal share of their husband's estates.

Another Advance in Flour. Ontario flour advanced another 25c. yesterday, making the total increase for the week 50c. A jump of 25c. having occurred on Monday. The wholesale price of Ontario flour on January 15 was \$4.85; yesterday's price, \$5.10.

Dealers say that it is not easy to predict to what extent the flour market will be further affected by a variety of unusual conditions brought about principally by the war.

SAYS GERMAN WAR MINISTER HAS RESIGNED

Berlin, Jan. 21 (via London).—The official Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung today announces that Lt. General Erich von Falkenhayn, who is now chief of the German general staff, has resigned his office as Minister of War. Emperor William, on accepting Von Falkenhayn's resignation, appointed him a General of Infantry.

Major-General Wilhelm von Hohenborn, according to the announcement, has been appointed to succeed General Von Falkenhayn as Minister of War.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the District Office, or by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Agency (not not Land Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within a quarter-section of the land, on a minimum of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after making homestead patent also 80 acres; extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. The homesteader must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 80 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to record and the homesteader must have a survey of his land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
