

CAPT. KENDALL MEETS MORE HARD LUCK

The Montrose, of which he is in command, runs ashore in the Loire, France.

Nantes, France, Sept. 24.—The British steamer Montrose, from Quebec, is ashore in the River Loire, with stokehold full of water.

The Montrose reported ashore in the Loire today, is the steamer that carried Dr. Harvey H. Crippen, the London wife murderer, and Ethel LeNeve on their flight to America in July, 1910. Her captain is the ill-fated H. G. Kendall, who was in command of the Empress of Ireland when she was run down and sunk in the Lower St. Lawrence last May with a loss of more than 1,000 lives. After being cleared by a government enquiry of responsibility for this disaster Captain Kendall was sent back to the Montrose.

The Montrose, it is supposed, was in French waters as a military transport.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton in unmined territory the tract person and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.
