London, April 17.—Today, the date fixed for the cabinet council to make a final decision as to whether married men should be conscripted, the attacks on the government's policy have been voted to the cause of conscription reached the climax of vehemence.

his judgment, take such steps as may be necessary to ensure that any person charged with such offences, Hon. Mr. Doherty accepted the amendment.
