

### "SILLY" SAYS JAP MINISTER

Hoping for Early Solution of International Problems

### SETTLEMENT NEAR ON CALIFORNIA MATTER

Expect Soon to Reach Agreement With China About Kiao Chiao

(Copyright, 1921, by Public Ledger.)  
Washington, Jan. 9.—Early solution of the three international problems confronting Japan—the restoration of Manchuria, continuing occupation of the Japanese troops from Siberia and the dispute with the United States over the California had been—was presented in an interview granted on Jan. 9 by Baron Uchida, Japanese minister to the United States, summary of which was received here today.

Baron Uchida is quoted as having said that the Japanese government had frequently created doubts in Japan's relations with the United States, but that he was sure a satisfactory solution of all issues with the United States would be reached eventually. He said that the war talk which was engaged in by some extremists was "silly."

Are Making Progress.

Comparatively satisfactory progress was being made in the Japanese-American negotiations, Baron Uchida said, but the long-pending question of such a character as those involved in the negotiations were not easily disposed of in a day. He indicated that even in the absence of serious misunderstandings the solution would be slow, due to the necessity of reconciling conflicting national interests. He paid tribute to the ability of China Shidehuan and Robert S. McNamara, American ambassador, to handle the situation and that he was convinced that a settlement shortly would be reached that would strengthen the relations between the two countries.

In discussion of the Chinese and Siberian situation he made the following points:

Japanese hoped China might soon become reunited and cease civil strife.

Internal Difficulties in Way.

Internal difficulties stood in the way of China's reaching an agreement with Japan for the restoration to China of Kiaocheu, but that the day would come when China would have enough confidence in Japan's sincerity to enter into direct negotiations with her.

The Siberian question was giving the Japanese government grave concern, but the Japanese government given up hope that a stable government would appear in Siberia, even though it might be only a local one.

Japan would not be able to withdraw from Vladivostok.

Friendly To Russia.

"Japan earnestly desires that the day may come when she will be able to resume friendly relations with a rehabilitated Russia," said Baron Uchida. "So that the two nations may cooperate together in contributing to the welfare of the world."

Baron Uchida also expressed Japan's determination to adhere to the League of Nations and to adopt an upright attitude in her task of working out the nation's destiny. Despite dissatisfaction on the part of a section of the Japanese public with the League, he expressed the opinion that Japan ought to work to make it perfect.

Montreal, Wis., January 9.—A wasp-waisted grand larceny against Pierre Paul Anther, Highland Park, Ill., chemist, who has been reported missing since January 1, was solved today after Philip Franzen, a university of Wisconsin employee, had charged Anther with having "stolen his wife at the point of a pistol" after forcing him to furnish \$100 for a "honeymoon."

Franzen's statement told a love quadrangle covering three continents and contained charges of double bigamy, gun play and infidelity. Anther, his wife in Highland Park, Franzen and his wife, who he says, left his home with Anther after telling him that she had married Anther thirteen years ago in Australia, were the three persons in the story told to the police.

Franzen said Anther, who has a wife and child in Highland Park, told him that he was married to a Mrs. Franzen thirteen years ago in Australia, that he became separated from her two years later and had been seeking her in Europe and America ever since. When Mrs. Franzen told Anther, she left her child in England.

Write Plains, N. Y., Jan. 9.—One's wife should not give one a tongue lashing simply because one returns home drunk six or seven times, nor should she get angry and seek a separation if one returns in kind and invites her to go out and drown herself.

This was the defence offered here today by James Hurst of Elmhurst, N. Y., before Judge Justice J. Addison Young in the suit of Mrs. Charlotte L. Hurst of Mount Vernon for separation and maintenance, Hurst denying that he ever had threatened her life.

"Six or seven times," Hurst testified, "I told her to go out and drown herself, and then I called her names, but it was always after she had given me a tongue lashing for nothing, and I guess I was drunk."

### Toronto Women Die After Seeing Doctor

Blood Treatment Cases Collapsed Suddenly After Visit to Physician.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—Two Toronto women after receiving a special blood treatment from Dr. J. M. McConnell, in his office at 1650 Dundas street west, Saturday afternoon collapsed and died within fifteen minutes of each other. The women were: Mrs. Emily Bond, Sumach street, Toronto, and Miss Monica Kenney, Palmerston avenue.

Miss Kenney was the first to collapse. She had only walked a few yards from the doctor's office when she dropped at the street. Death occurred before the arrival of Dr. McConnell, who was hastily summoned. By the time Dr. McConnell returned to his office Mrs. Bond had collapsed and despite all respiratory efforts on the part of Doctors McConnell and Percy A. Ford, she failed to rally, dying in the office.

In a statement issued Dr. McConnell declared that both women had received similar blood treatments before and were showing improvement. "This treatment is made in Toronto," says the statement, "it is recognized by the medical profession as an excellent remedy and has been used many times by me. This happened so suddenly that I cannot understand it. I had a dozen patients waiting in my office when it happened."
