PROVINCE EXPECTS \$20,000,000 REVENUE

No Liquor Advertising Signs Will be Permitted Within the Province.

Victoria, B. C., May 1.—With the coming into force of the British Cotombia Liquor Act, the province emerges from a three and a null year "ary" period. The present act is the recurs of the referendum taken on October 20 last throughout the province, when the people emphatically voted for the sale of liquor in sealed packages by the government. The majority in myor of repealing the Prohibition Act was about 40,000.

The Prohibition Act, which closed the bars and all public drinking places throughout the province, came into force on the first day of October 1917, during the war, when the people, by small majority, voted to prohibit the male of liquor except by government dispensaries. In order to purchase liquor under the Prohibition Act, was necessary to first obtain a prescription from a medical doctor for which a fee \$2.00 was charged. The maximum quantity purchaseable from a government dispensary was two guilons of liquor. So great was the rush on the dispensaries and so many prescriptions were being issued, that the government at the session of the legislature in 1920 amended the Prohibition Act prohibiting the sale by government of dispensaries of more than eight ounces on a doctor's prescription.

A Moderation League was organized to work for the repeal of the act, the object of the organization being to meant control. The beside the distributing centre for the province is in Vancouver. It is expected that the sale of liquor during the first year under government control will amount to \$20,000,000. The government has promised that half the profits will be handed over to the municipalities.

Under the British Columbia Liquor Under the British Columbia Liquor Act government stores are established throughout the province for the sale of liquor. These stores are administered by the Liquor Control Beard and each vendor is an employee of the Board. Sales must only be made to those persons holding a government permit for the purchase of liquor, and his permit along with a written order are liquor must be presented at the

permit for the purchase of liquor, and his permit along with a written order ar liquor must be presented at the time of purchase. Delivery of liquor can only be made in sealed packages, and consumption of liquor on store premises is not allowed. Liquor stores will not remain open for more than eight hours a day.

Persons applying for a liquor permit must be of the full age of 21 years and have resided in the province for at least one month. The fee for a permit limited to a single purchase of liquor is 50 cents. This entitles the purchaser to buy a maximum quantity of two quarts of liquor other than malt liquor or 12 quarts of malt liquor. The fee for a permit to purchase of malt liquor of alcohol by weight, is \$2.00 and the fee for any other permit is \$5.00. No person is allowed to obtain more than ten single-purchase permits in any one year. A fee of \$5.00 is charged for permits to persons temporarily resident in the province. These are good for two weeks only. A permit must not be transferred. All permits expire on the slist of December of the year in which they are issued. The Liquor Control Board has power to cancel permits, as has also a Justice of those convicted of a violation of the Liquor Act.

Cannot Get Drunk.

Cannot Get Drunk

Drunkenness under the Act will not be permitted, and no person shall permit drunkenness to take place in any house or on any premises of which ne is the owner, tenant or occupant. Liquor must an intoxicated person be allowed to consume liquor on any premises. No person shall keep or consume liquor in any part of an inn other than a private guest-room, and no person who is not a bona-fide guest of the inn shall be permitted to have or consume liquor in an inn.

No display of liquor signs is allowed except by government stores. No person other than a government vendor shall sell or deal in any liquor known as beer or near-beer.


