Cumberland Coal-The Spring Hill Mine.

The people of these Provinces have always been too ready to sell their mines and other sources of wealth to outsiders. Instead of combining to work valuable mines and stone quarries, they have allowed them to seek purchasers in England and the United States. Lumber and ships have almost monopolized our capital and enterprise. This policy is more the result of too little confidence in our own resources than of too little capital. There is money enough in bank vaults at four per cent interest, swelling the extravagant profits of rich corporations and aiding in the over importation of goods, to open up several productive sources of national wealth. But people are afraid. This was fully shown when an earnest attempt was made to have the working capital of the Spring Hill Coal Mining Company—\$130,000—taken up by a popular subscription. The shares were put at \$50, full information respecting the character of the coal, the vastness of the deposit, and the facilities for shipping were published, and yet people with from \$50 to \$5000 to invest were afraid to subscribe. The stock of the Company—\$400,000—employed. A working way has been expected satisfactory dividends on, and after a time, a few capitalists stepped in and divided the shares between them. The stock is now at a premium, and there is no working capital. A dividend of ten per cent has already been declared on the whole working capital paid up by the 12th of last April, and yet the permanent works have not been opened—nothing but experimental shafts have been sunk and primitive methods of raising coal employed. A working way has been expected satisfactory dividends on, and after a time, a few capitalists stepped in and divided the shares between them. The stock is now at a premium, and there is no working capital. A dividend of ten per cent has already been declared on the whole working capital paid up by the 12th of last April, and yet the permanent works have not been opened—nothing but experimental shafts have been sunk and primitive methods of raising coal employed.

Our Militia Officers. To the Editor of the Tribune. Sir: Your editorial yesterday on militia-management calls for a few words if only to show that there may be different points of opinion among militia officers. Soldiers are, proverbially, grumblers, but to severely criticize the action of superior officers is unwarranted. The reasons for having the militia organized in different parts of the Province medially examined at Fredericton might have been found perfectly good, if the officer who is responsible for the order had discussed the matter with those gentlemen who now criticize it, which discussion would be in a military sense impossible. Again, a young subaltern may not be the best person to lead a militia drill, or has been at a military school, or commanded a battalion, that he is able to command the Canadian army. The fitness for high command may be shown by great natural ability and thorough study, and if possible actual experience in the field. The qualifications are possessed by Colonel Robertson Ross, and also by the Adjutant-General, Colonel MacDonnell. The officers commanding the regular militia are, however, known to be gentlemen who have made gunnery and military engineering a life study, and are thoroughly competent. We have no Canadian officers who had an opportunity to become competent for these positions.
