DEMAND THAT GOVERNMENT REDUCE DEFICIT—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

#### METRIC CONVERSION

MINISTER'S MEETING WITH RETAIL INDUSTRY REPRESENTATIVES—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Bill Domm (Peterborough): Madam Speaker, on May 14, 1982, as reported at page 17449 of *Hansard*, the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs (Mr. Ouellet) stated that he was ready to have discussions with the retail food industry to find out if it was feasible to excuse some small retailers from compulsory metrication. Yesterday I learned from a confidential source that, instead of working with the group on scales, which includes some 50 representatives of the whole industry, he intends to meet next Monday with only six members of the group who represent umbrella associations within the retail food industry under the chairmanship of an employee of the Toledo Scale Manufacturing Company of the United States. I therefore move, seconded by the hon. member for Cambridge (Mr. Speyer):

That in view of the quite disastrous effects of the present economic situation on Canadian businesses, particularly small businesses which include the independent food retailers, the industry as a whole, represented by the working group on

scales, some 50 members, should be fully consulted, rather than this apparent doublecross and the stacking of the deck against the small independent retailers.

#### MINES AND MINING

POSTPONEMENT OF CONSTRUCTION OF ALUMINUM SMELTER AT BALMORAL, MAN.—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Terry Sargeant (Selkirk-Interlake): Madam Speaker, yesterday in Winnipeg the president of the Aluminum Company of Canada announced the postponement of construction of a 200,000 tonne aluminum smelter in Balmoral, Manitoba. Whereas this announcement means the loss, for now, of some 700 permanent jobs, to say nothing of jobs in site construction and the needed hydro development, and whereas the company laid the blame for this postponement on weak markets, lower prices, and other ramifications of the continuing recession, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Churchill (Mr. Murphy):

That this government abandon its ruinous economic policies which have strangled the Canadian economy, costing tens of thousands of jobs in its vain attempt to save it from inflation.

### THE CONSTITUTION

PROPOSED ERECTION OF PATRIATION MONUMENT ON PARLIAMENT HILL—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43
