THE HOUSE.

We copy, to-day, a short debate which took place in the Upper House, on the Seat of Government question, in which Mr. Vankoughnet replies to several questions put to him by Mr. DeBlaquiere. It will remove all doubt, if any still exist, as to the intention of Ministers, removing at once to Quebec, and at the same time proceeding with the erection of new buildings at Ottawa. It is to be regretted that a removal to Quebec, was thought of at all; but it appears to have become a necessity, without which the members from the Quebec district would have voted against Ottawa, and the question would have been as undecided as ever.

Mr. Vankoughnet assured the Council. that notwithstanding the late hostile vote of that branch of the Legislature, the Cabinet had seen no reason to change its opinion upon the question of a removal. If the Upper House still persisted in its objections, it would have an opportunity to advance then in a practical shape, by dealing at the proper time and in the usual manner, with any mone bills from the Assembly that might be lai before them. The honorable member added that preliminary steps had already been taken to carry out the Queen's decision by adopting measures for the erection of buildings at Ottawa without delay.
