

BRITAIN NOW MISTRESS OF AIR

Henry Farman an Easy Winner in the Championship Contest at Rheims—The Surprise of the Meet.

Betheny Aviation Field, Rheims, France, Aug. 27.—Henry Farman, the English aviator, a dark horse in the aviation contests, in a biplane of his own design, today broke the world's record for duration of flight and distance in a heavier than air machine, and won the grand prix de la champagne—the endurance test, by a remarkable flight officially recorded as 180 kilometres (111.78 miles) in three hours, four minutes, fifty-six and two-fifths seconds. He actually covered an extra kilometre and remained in the air ten minutes after 7.30 o'clock this evening, the hour that the time keeper under the rules, ceased to keep a record of the flight.

The Contestants.

The other contestants finished as follows:
Hubert Latham, in monoplane No. 25—154 kilometres, 500 metres, time 2 hours, 18 minutes, 9.2.5 seconds; Louis Paulhan, in a Voisin biplane—131 kilometres; Count de Lambert, biplane—116 kilometres; Hubert, in monoplane No. 13—111 kilometres; Roger Sommer, biplane—90 kilometres; M. de la Grance, monoplane—50 kilometres; M. Bleriot, monoplane—40 kilometres; Glen H. Curtiss, biplane—30 kilometres; M. Lefebvre, biplane—21 kilometres.

Although Hubert Latham with a different machine, took second and fifth

positions, the aviation committee held that he was not eligible for two prizes and awarded the fifth to M. Tissandier and the sixth to M. Sommer.

Complete Surprise.

While Farman's brilliant record as an aeroplane pilot should have warned the sharps that he was a dangerous competitor, his victory was a complete surprise. He had been preparing his machine secretly, and had not appeared upon the field until today except for a few practice flights and had been almost forgotten.

Indeed, after he started about 4.30 p. m., keeping close to the ground, while Latham and others were soaring in spectacular fashion high in the air, Farman had attracted no attention until he had flown 80 kilometres. Then suddenly the watchers woke up and began to make inquiries, only to discover that he had gone out carrying petrol enough for a five hour flight and equipped with a self cooling revolving motor built by the Gnome company after his own design.

All eyes had been riveted on the beautiful and graceful monoplane of Latham, who, after Tissandier's foul of Paulhan's chances, had become the favorite for the grand prix de la champagne. They also had watched the enchanting changing picture unfolding above the sunlit plane of Betheny while winged-men birds circling and wheeling, a genuine race, five miles between two biplanes and Latham's soaring monoplane and finally the arrival of two huge dirigibles, that evoked like great giants of the air above the fleet nimble machines in the lower stratum. The thousands of spectators literally rubbed their eyes to make sure that this evidence of men having conquered the air was not a dream.

TRADE DISPUTES.

Statistics About Them for the Last Month.

The Labor Gazette reports that the number of trade disputes in existence in Canada during July was 15, and an increase of one compared with the previous month, and an increase of five compared with July 1908. About 73 firms and 4,398 employees, of which number 31 firms and 3,119 employees were affected by new disputes. The loss of time to employees through trade disputes during July was approximately 118,740 working days, compared with a loss of 86,806 in June, and 21,000 in July 1908.

CHINA EMBARGO ON BRITISH WARES

Chinese Government Orders Strictest Measures Against Anti-British Movement in Kiangsi.

Pekin, Aug. 27.—It is said that Prince Tsai Hsuan, the prince regent's brother, will visit America in November. The announcement is contained in special instructions from the throne to the minister to the United States, Chang Yin-Taung, to hasten preparations for his departure to Washington. Prince Tsai Hsuan is president of the new navy board and will investigate the navy and naval administrations of Japan, America and Europe.

Instructions Sent.

Instructions have been sent to the viceroy of Nanking and the governor of Kiangsi to adopt the most repressive measures to stamp out the boycott against the British along the Yangtze River. The boycott already in force, shipping and all other British interests being seriously affected. The movement is the outcome of the killing of a Chinaman by Police Inspector Mears at Kiuksiang. Inspector Mears was acquitted by Consular Court. The Chinese allege this was a miscarriage of justice and are actively agitating the boycott, which is spreading throughout the valley. The British charge that the agitation is largely attributable to the American missionaries too great sympathy for the Chinese.

Persistently Boycott.

The Chinese also persistently boycott all goods carried on the steamship Tatsu Maru. The owner of the vessel has applied to the Japanese Department of Communications for permission to change the name of the vessel, but he has not been successful. The Chinese boycott against Japanese goods had its origin in the indignation of the Cantonese people caused by what they termed the weak cowardice of China in acceding to the demands of Japan relative to the seizure of the Japanese steamship Tatsu Maru off Macao on the charge that she was engaged in running contraband of war for Chinese revolutionists. When captured the Tatsu Maru had on board 1500 rifles and 40,000 rounds of ammunition, all manifested, and 750 rifles not on manifest. In compliance with Japanese demands China agreed to pay \$10,700 for the cargo, pay the costs caused by the seizure, salute the hoisting of the Japanese flag on the vessel and punish the officers responsible for the seizure. The Tatsu Maru was seized by Captain Woo King-yun, in command of the Pau Pih. Captain Woo was graduated from the Lowell Mass. High school, and was near graduation from Yale when he was recalled by his Government. He was in the battle of the Yalu, became disgusted, resigned and entered commercial pursuits. He re-entered the service at the time of the Boxer rebellion.

ARMENIANS DID NOT INCITE WAR

Government Commission Decides That Community is Not to Blame For the Massacres at Adana.

Constantinople, Aug. 27.—In consequence of strong pressure exerted by the religious and civil leaders of the Armenian community and their many supporters in the Committee of Union and Progress, the Government recently appointed a Commission composed of the Ministers of Finance, Public Works and Justice, to prepare a declaration acquitting the Armenians of all responsibility for the outbreak at Adana. This declaration drawn up after a careful examination of the reports of the members of the Parliamentary Commission on the massacres and approved by the Council of Ministers, was published in all the journals of the capital. It acquits the Armenians at Adana of the charge of conspiracy, and ascribes the massacre to the ignorance of the population. In the reign of Abdul Hamid the people had become imbued with the idea that every Armenian was a separatist at heart, and were therefore averse from equality with the Armenian community. They had become in consequence the tools of religious or political agitators. The declaration censures severely the local officials for their failure, not only to quell the outbreak, but to warn the Government that the situation in Cilicia was critical. Copies of this official declaration are being sent to all the provincial administrative centres for publication and distribution in the villages.

AFTER TREASURE.

Another Party to Search for Kidd's Wealth.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 27.—An attempt is to be made next week by H. L. Bowden, H. V. Adams and his associates to recover the treasure which is supposed to have been hidden by Capt. Kidd at a spot on Oak Island, off Chester, N. S. Special apparatus has been secured and if the treasure is on the spot where search is to be made, it is expected to be raised inside a week.
