By the Honorable Mr. Flint; of Aza Parker and others of the Village of Eurriti's Rapids. Ontario.

By the Honorable Mr. Bureau; of William Wagner, of the City of Montreal.

By the Honorable Mr. Macpherson; of the Royal Canadian Bank.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following Potitions were severally read, viz:

Of H. D. Smith, M. P., and others, of the Village of Merrickville, in the Province of Ontario; praying that the Rideau Canal may be closed to traffic on the Sabbath Day.

Of Caldwell Pollock and others, of the Village of Lanark; of Gilbert Cannon and others, of the Village of Almonte; of the Board of Trade of Guelph; and of William Warwick and others, of the Town of Woodstock, in the Province of Ontario; severally praying that in any legislation on the subject of Banking no change of a fundamental character may be made in the present system, and that the circulation of the Banks be preserved on its present basis.

Of William Bartlett and others, of the Town of Sherbrooke, in the Province of Quebec; praying for the passing of a Patent Law similar to that of England, or for the passing of a Law granting Patents to the Inventors alone, irrespective of nationality or residence.

Of Alexander Munro and others, of the Province of New Brunswick; praying for the construction of a Canal to connect Bay Verte with the waters of the Bay of Fundy.

The Honorable Mr. Allan, from the Committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills, to whom was referred the Bill intituled: "An Act to unite the Beaver and the Toronto" Mutual Fire Insurance Companies," reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the House without any amendment.
