Dear Mr. Keppel:

The receipt of a cheque for \$125.00, covering quarterly instalment to the Canadian Association for International Conciliation for the quarter ending June 30, 1916, brings to my mind the intention I have had for some little time of writing you with reference to the allowance made by the Executive Committee of the Carnegie Endowment for the work of the Canadian Association for the current fiscal year.

As you know, on account of the War, it has not seemed expedient or desirable to do other than allow the work of the Canadian Association to remain in abeyance for the time being. Consequently, while I have accepted the quarterly cheques as they have come to hand, I have deposited them in trust for the work of the Canadian Association, and have not regarded them in any way as repayment for any expenditures incurred, but simply as a source to be drawn upon in the event of contingencies arising which would occasion this. It now looks as though without doubt the War would continue beyond the period of the present quarter, so that at the end of it the
