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remarks the German press today. The English were particularly annoyed that the German official statements of the loss of 11 U-boats. Mr. Churchill and the Ministry of Information have been using the simple expedient of reporting U-boats sunk every time they needed to console the public because of heavy English losses. Thus the reliable German figures were in painful contrast to the free English fabrications. The English even took the Führer's recent speech to try to prove that German losses were greater than stated. All the Führer said, however, was that if one were to believe Mr. Churchill's fanciful reports Germany would have no U-boats at all. When Mr. Churchill cannot even tell the truth about English loss of ships, but first denies, and finally is forced to admit their loss, how can one expect anything near the truth from him about German losses, asked the German press.

Sir John Simon's radio speech on the War, was the subject of brief comment in the German press this morning. Sir John could not find a single English or French military success to which he could point, says Der Montag. He spoke only of the purported success of political intrigues, but did not mention Germany's successful defence of this sphere. The only thing of importance which Sir John had to say was, that the German people and Der Führer are completely united. This discovery constitutes a considerable change in England's political attitude. It is a recreation of all the years of English untruths about German elections and plebiscites and a departure from the English speeches and leaflets aimed at the German -----. England now, concludes Der Montag, as she faces a determined nation of 80,000,000 people ---- to reply to the English attack by the strong English plutocracy. Once more a deliberate lie has been circulated by the British Air Ministry.
