One Man, One Vote

ELECTOR—You have declared yourself in favor of "One Man, One Vote". What do you mean by that?

GEORGE MAROIL—It means that every citizen over twenty-one years old should have a vote, and keep it, irrespective of his financial situation. The compulsory vote is making great headway the world over. Before long it will obtain in Canada, applying perhaps to both sexes. In Montreal, this year, twenty-two thousand of our fellow-citizens have been disqualified for non-payment of the water-tax. How could they be compelled to vote? And it is not dangerous to deprive them of any say in matters of vital importance to them? Disqualification for arrears of taxes should be abolished at once, and I will do all I can to attain that end.

ELECTOR—Do you think tenants should be eligible for Mayor and Alderman?

GEORGE MAROIL—Why, certainly. Tenants are now eligible as Controllers. And the Controllers handle all the City funds. Why should the area of choice be restricted in the case of the Mayor and Aldermen, who act in a legislative capacity only.
