Newspapers, Magazines, and other Printed Papers not subject to letter postage, must be paid at the time of mailing at the rate of one penny per sheet, or for every 16 pages; otherwise they will be charged full letter

postage.

Newspapers published in the Colony can be sent to Great Britain either by way of Halifax, Boston, or New York; by Halifax they are free of postage if sent within seven days from the date of publication,—by New York or Boston, the sender must pay two pence on each. It is recommended that the name and address of the party for whom they are intended should be written on the margin of the paper, as well as on the wrapper or cover in which they are enclosed; this ensures their delivery in case of the cover becoming destroyed; but it is to be particularly observed that newspapers intended to go free via Halifax, must have no mark, initials, or date on the directions, but the address merely, or they will be chargeable with full letter postage.
