4. Give the principal parts of the verbs to which belong *elapsus, flexit, compositus, quiescit, disjungimur*. Write out the tenses *it* and *prodimur*.

5. In the above extracts :—

(a) *lactissimus umbræ*. What case? Explain its use.

(b) *caput aeris equi*. What case and why?

(c) *facilem victu*. In this a noun or the Supine of a verb? Of what two verbs might it be the Supine?

(d) *discumbitur ostro*. Explain this construction.

6. Name four classes of *Numerals* and give Latin for "nine," "ninth," "nine each," "nine times."

7. Translate into Latin :—1. The winds in a body rush where the gate was opened to them. 2. He sees no ship in sight, but three stags wandering on the shore. 3. Then Dido with downcast look briefly speaks forth.

CÆSAR.

(A) Discedens ab hibernis Cæsar in Italiam, ut quotannis facere consueverat, legatis imperat, quos legionibus præfecerat, uti, quam plurimas possent, hieme naves ædificandas veteresque reliquendas curarent. Earum modum formamque demonstrat. Ad celeritatem onerandi subductionesque paulo facit humiliores, quam quibus in nostro mari uti consuevimus—at que id eo magis, quod propter crebras commutationes aestuum minus magnos ibi fluctus fieri cognoverat—ad onera et ad multitudinem iumentorum transportandam paulo latiores, quam quibus in reliquis utimur maribus. Has omnes actuarias imperiat fieri, quam ad rem multum humilitas adjuvat. Ea, quæ sunt usui ad armandas naves, ex Hispania apportari jubet.—*BELL. BRIT. LIB. V., CH. I.*

(B) Toto hoc in genere pugnae, quum sub oculis omnium ac pro castris dimicaretur, intellectum est, nostros propter gravitatem armaturæ—quod neque insequi credentes possent, neque ab signis discedere auderent—minus aptos esse ad hujus generis hostem; equites autem magno cum periculo dimicare, propterea quod illi etiam consulto plerumque cederent, et, quum paulum ab legionibus nostros removissent, ex cædis desilirent, et pedibus dispari prælio contenderent. Equestris autem prælii ratio et cedentibus et insequentibus par atque idem periculum inferebat. Accedebat huc, ut nunquam conferti, sed rari magnisque intervallis præliarentur, stationesque dispositas haberent, atque alios alii deinceps exciperent, integrique et recentes defatigatis succederent.—*BELL. BRIT. LIB. V., CH. 16.*
