CALGARY, N.W.T.—A by-law which passed its first reading provides for the issuing of debentures for \$75,000 for erection of a new city hall.—Geo. M. Lang, architect, has completed plans for the sanitarium to be built here by Dr. Ernest Wills.

ST. CATHARINES, ONT.—Tenders for electrical apparatus for the Welland Canal, including arc lamps, regulators, switchboards and other apparatus, are invited by the Dominion Government up to March 28th. Plans at office of the Superintending Engineer here.

ALMONTE, ONT.—St. Andrews' church congregation will hold a meeting this week to consider the question of building a Sunday School hall.—The question of engaging an engineer to advise the Council regarding the development of the town's water power is under consideration.

FREDERICTON, N. B.—Tenders will be received by Chief Commissioner LaBilious up to April 11th for rebuilding Hall's Creek bridge in parish of Moncton, Harshman's bridge in parish of Shediac and Norton Station bridge in Kings County.

QUEBEC, QUE.—The Minister of the Interior has authorized the purchase of a site here for the new Immigrant Detention Hospital.—The sum of \$4,000 has been subscribed towards a new Sunday School building for St. Andrew's church, of which Rev. A. T. Love is pastor.

OUTREMONT, QUE.—Joseph Beaubien, on behalf of the Roman Catholic parish, has purchased the Church of the Ascension property as a site for a new R. C. edifice to be built in the near future. The Church of the Ascension have completed arrangements for a new church to be built on Park avenue.

HAMILTON, ONT.—The directors of the Y. M. C. A. are considering the renovation of the building.—The Minister of Public Works, when in the city last week, stated that the question of the improvement of the harbor would receive immediate consideration.—Hannah street Methodist church purpose building a new parsonage.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—Emerson & Fisher have bought land on the west side of Germain street on which they will erect a five-storey brick building, 60x100 feet.—W. Murdoch, Waterworks Superintendent, has reported on an extension of the water service in the East End, the cost of which will be about \$75,000.
